

COURSE DESCRIPTION & MATERIALS:

Catalog Description: An axiomatic approach to geometry to include contrasting traditional and modern approaches to geometry, an introduction to non-Euclidean geometry with historical perspectives, and applications. **Prerequisite:** Math 3325.

Required Textbook: M.J. Greenberg, Euclidean and Non-Euclidean Geometries: Development and History (1993), 3rd ed. Freemen, ISBN 0-7167-2446-4.

Calculator Policy: A scientific non-graphing, non-programmable calculator is required and allowed on all exams. Calculators will not be provided. Calculators may not be shared. NOTE: Laptops, cell phone, & other mobile devices are NOT acceptable calculators.

Student Learner Objectives: Students will gain understanding and knowledge of Euclidean and non-Euclidean geometry and their applications. Students who successfully complete the course will:

- Become familiar with the basic concepts of modern geometry and differences in approaches.
- Be able to explain the foundations of geometry to include the characteristics and properties of geometric entities.
- Become familiar with the basic concepts of non-Euclidean geometry.
- Develop a proficiency in reading, constructing and writing mathematical proofs in the context of an axiomatic approach to geometry.

In particular, students who successfully complete the course will demonstrate an understanding and working knowledge of:

- The basic concepts of modern geometry and differences in approaches.
- The foundations of geometry to include the characteristics and properties of geometric entities.
- The Axiomatic approach to geometry and proofs.
- Euclid's elements and influence of parallel postulate.
- Incidence Axioms and set theory with implications.
- Triangles and congruence criteria.
- Euclidean geometry to include trigonometry, coordinates and vectors.
- The basic concepts of non-Euclidean geometry to include other models of hyperbolic geometry.
- The basic concepts of spherical geometry.

The instructor reserves the right to modify/update the topics as appropriate.

COURSE WORK & GRADE DISTRIBUTION:

Class Attendance/Participation: Students are expected to regularly attend class and prepare for class by reading appropriate section(s) in the text and completing assignments before class. Students are also expected to participate in class discussions. Consistency and effort are the factors considered toward grade (e.g., in cases of one point difference between calculated grade and next letter grade).

Assignments: There will be regular homework assignments that are to be submitted as indicated by instructor or posted on Blackboard.

Papers: There will be 2 papers over each book, Flatland and Sphereland. More detailed guidelines will be provided later. The first paper will have an in-class peer review (rough draft) due on February 26th and the final draft due on March 6th. The second paper will have an in-class peer review (rough draft) due on April 15th and the final draft due on April 24th.

Examinations: There will be two exams during the semester and a final (comprehensive) exam.

Final Exam: In order to pass this class, students *must* take a comprehensive final exam scheduled during Finals Week. Finals cannot be rescheduled or missed (for dire & unforeseen medical or family emergencies, students must consult with me). The final exam may be used to replace your lowest regular exam grade. **The final exam must be completed by the announced due date. NO EXCEPTIONS.**

Course Objectives: That student should perform at a 70% or better average on exams, homework, class participation, & final covering the topics listed in the course description.

Make-up Policy: There are no make-up for daily assignments, rather the lowest of these will be dropped. You are expected to always be present for major exams. Exams must be taken on the date specified. **No make-up exams will be given**. However, the lowest of the three regular exams may be replaced by the percentage final exam score. Extenuating circumstances that may force a student to miss a test should be discussed with the instructor immediately, if possible before the scheduled test date.

Late Work Policy: Acceptance of late homework is at the discretion of the instructor. Normally it will be graded if it is feasible to do so. Once a graded homework has been returned, late homework will not be accepted.

NOTE: There will NOT be an extra credit assignment, please DO NOT asks for it at the end of the semester. Start studying today! You have enough time to get the perfect grade. To be successful in this course, take responsibility for your learning & plan to study at least 2 hours for each class hour. Do not get behind; do not hesitate to ask for help. Make good use of the resources that are available to you, especially your book & your instructor. Save all your graded assignments, exams & homework until you receive your final grade.

COURSE POLICIES & EXPECTATIONS

Electronic Communication & Announcements: To contact me outside of the classroom, students should use their university issued email address. I will reply to questions & concerns within 48 hrs. Also students are expected to check Blackboard for important announcements & course materials.

Class Attendance: Attending class is **mandatory** & attendance will be taken daily. Absences of students are recorded without exception, from the official date of enrollment. Both tardiness and early departure from class may be considered forms of absenteeism. In all cases, students will be held responsible for completion of course requirements covered in their absence. Students are expected to attend class as scheduled and be prepared to participate in discussions, in-class exercises, quizzes and problem presentation. If you miss class,

you are responsible for finding out what you missed on that day. You are welcome to ask questions on the topics that you missed; however, it is your responsibility to learn the material. You are strongly encouraged to attend all classes. In addition, if an unavoidable situation prevents you from being on time or if you must leave early, please minimize class interruption.

Civility in the Classroom: Students are expected to be supportive & encouraging to other students to help create a positive learning environment. Thus I respectfully ask that you not use cell phones, laptops, or other electronic devices in class for any non-course related purposes. <u>Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance:</u> According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. If Title IV funds are disbursed to ineligible students (including students who fail to begin attendance), the institution must return these funds to the U.S. DoE within 30 days of becoming aware that the student will not or has not begun attendance. Faculty will provide the Office of Financial Aid with an electronic notification if a student has not attended the first week of class. Any student receiving federal financial aid who does not attend the first week of class will have their aid terminated and returned to the DoE. Please note that any student who stops attending at any time during the semester may also need to return a portion of their federal aid.

A non-punitive drop does not affect the student's GPA. However, course drops that exceed the maximum allowed by SB 1231 will be treated as "F" grades and will impact the student's GPA.
