### **Course Description and Materials**

**Catalog Description:** The history of mathematics is a vast subject, and this course concentrates on early mathematical discoveries from ancient Egypt, Mesopotamia, Greece, China, India, the Middle East, and Europe to the period right before Newton and Leibniz, assuming that the students would be exposed to subsequent developments in mathematics in other courses.

**Prerequisite:** MATH 2114 and MATH 2314; both prerequisites require a grade of "C" or higher.

**Required Textbook:** Journey Through Genius: The Great Theorems of Mathematics by William Dunham (the 1<sup>st</sup> edition), Wiley with ISBN: 978-0-471-50030-8.

Student Learner Objectives: Upon the completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Understand the development of mathematics, see the ways various mathematical concepts were initially presented, and compare this with contemporary approaches.
- 2. Gain deeper insights into mathematical concepts and be introduced to new mathematical ideas through exposure to primary historical sources and other materials.
- 3. Understand the contributions of some of the world's great mathematicians to a wide variety of mathematical areas/fields/topics, see how various mathematical concepts/results are interrelated to each other and how/where important mathematical ideas come from.
- 4. Appreciate the significant contributions that female and nonwestern mathematicians made to the mathematics discipline throughout history using a historical viewpoint on and a humanistic approach to the evolution of mathematics.
- 5. Perceive how mathematicians think and do mathematics, and enhance your ability to think logically in attacking and solving a wide variety of problems.
- 6. Improve your written and oral communication skills in the context of mathematics.

**List of Topics:** Topics to be covered include but are not limited to the following:

- 2. Euclid's Proof of the Pythagorean Theorem (ca. 300 B.C.) (Chapter 2).
- 3. Euclid and the Infinitude of Primes (ca. 300 B.C.) (Chapter 3).
- 4. Archimedes' Determination of Circular Area (ca. 225 D.C.) (Chapter 4).
- 5. Heron's Formula for Triangular Area (ca. A.D. 75) (Chapter 5).
- 6. Cardano and the Solution of the Cubic (1545) (Chapter 6).

- 7. A Gem from Isaac Newton (Late 1660s) (Chapter 7).
- 8. The Bemoullis and the Harmonic Series (1689) (Chapter 8).
- 9. The Extraordinary Sums of Leonhard Euler (1734) (Chapter 9).
- 10. A Sampler of Euler's Number Theory (1736) (Chapter 10).
- 11. The Non-Denumerability of the Continuum (1874) (Chapter 11).
- 12. Cantor and the Transfinite Realm (1891) (Chapter 12).

The instructor reserves the right to modify/update the topics as appropriate.

**Inquiry-Based Active Learning:** This course implements inquiry-based active learning approaches throughout, and thus the students are strongly encouraged to preview the teaching materials and be aware of many class-participation and self/peer study activities.

**NOTE.** This class meets three times a week. Aside from the three hours that you spend in class each week, you should devote at least another 4~6 hours to studying on your own: reading the book and my lecture notes, working out your homework assignments, and solving some extra related problems for practice etc. You are responsible for any and all materials/topics discussed in this class.

## **Course Expectations and Requirements**

**Examinations:** There will be twelve midterm tests (essays) during the semester and one comprehensive final exam (final essay) in the end (scheduled during the Finals Week).

Each test (essay) covers the corresponding chapter.

Students will take all examinations at regularly scheduled times. Exceptions for a legitimate reason may be granted and must be approved in advance by your instructor. Students should notify, or under certain unusual circumstances have other(s) to notify, the instructor formally that you will miss, or have missed an exam, and provide a reason with accompanying documents supporting that, for your absence within 24hrs of the scheduled exam date. Your instructor can be notified via e-mail with a written notice. Contact beforehand your instructor to make necessary arrangement, if you know in advance that you will be unable to take an exam at the regular class time. Students who fail to follow the prescribed procedure will receive a **GRADE OF ZERO** on the missed exam.

Examples of valid documented excuses are sickness documented with a doctor's note, death in the family documented with a copy of the death notice, attending university-sponsored events with a Dean's excuse, etc. Minor illness, or attending sports events and like kind (without a Dean's excuse) are not examples of emergency situations.

**NOTE.** The schedules will be announced at least a week ahead of time in class, in Blackboard, and through emails. The tests/exam will be taken completely in class. Once found, the tests/final exam would receive a **GRADE OF ZERO**, and if this happened in a recursive manner, the instructor would report to the university as an academic dishonesty issue.

**Presentations/Debates**: Students will be expected to participate in class presentations/debates, emphasizing the most recently covered topics that are related to and complementing essays.

**Research Project**: Towards the end of the semester, you will be given a book chapter to read and write a research report, along with some other work. This is to expose you first experience to mathematical research.

**Evaluation of Student Performance**: Every student's grade will be based entirely on his/her performance. Students will not compete against one another for grades.

<u>Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance:</u> According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance.
