COURSE DESCRIPTION:

An introduction to the basic elements of music theory for non-music majors: scales, intervals, keys, triads, elementary ear training, keyboard harmony, notation, meter, and rhythm. This course meets the standards for the Creative Arts category of courses under the core curriculum.

COURSE GOALS:

- To gain a broader understanding of basic analytical elements of music and how they fit together.
- To gain and demonstrate music literacy.
- To obtain the necessary tools for creating and notating original compositions effectively and efficiently.

ADDITIONAL CORE CURRICULUM GOALS:

The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board (THECB) requires a core curriculum for all undergraduate students at public higher education institutions in Texas. The purpose is to develop essential knowledge and skills to be successful in college, in a career, in communities, and in life. This course meets the standards for the Creative Arts category of courses under the core curriculum and incorporates the following four learning objectives as required by the THECB:

- Teamwork (ability to consider different points of view and to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal)

ATTENDANCE:

QUIZZES:

- Since learning music works like a pyramid, it is essential to master an individual skill/concept before proceeding to the next one. This is the key to success on the quizzes and the course in general. See the Course Schedule below for quiz dates.
- There is no traditional final exam for this class. However, students will have the option to retake up to two quizzes of their choice during the final exam time assigned to the class. Students must notify the instructor at least 24 hours prior to the exam time of which quizzes they intend to retake. Please refer to the university's academic calendar for final exam days and times.

MINI-COMPOSITIONS:

Students will be asked to create two, small, original compositions using the skills learned in class. A separate assignment sheet will be posted to Blackboard with details on the requirements for each mini-composition. See the Course Schedule below for due dates.

FINAL COMPOSITION AND PRESENTATION:

Students will receive a list of selected poems and will create a composition using the poem of their choice from that list. Students will then share their composition and their creative process via an oral presentation to the class. A separate assignment sheet will be posted to Blackboard with details on the requirements for the final composition and presentation. Students will also write peer responses as part of this assignment. See the Course Schedule below for due dates.

GROUP DISCUSSION AND REFLECTION PROJECT:

Students will be divided into small groups of 4-5 people to read and discuss an assigned article. Each student will then write a reflection on both the article and their discussion experience. Group members will be determined no later than the end of the 5th week of class. A separate assignment sheet will be posted to Blackboard with further details on the requirements for the group project. This project should be completed no later than Friday, March 22.

POP QUIZZES:

Pop quizzes are occasionally given as an additional measure for monitoring progress. Since pop quizzes are an unannounced surprise, they will only be for extra credit. However, this surprise nature also means that pop quizzes cannot be made up at a later time.
