Course Description (from the A&M-SA Course Catalog)

This course is designed to assist first-year students in adjusting to university expectations through enhancing quantitative reasoning skills and acquiring essential skills for academic success.

Course Overview

This course is designed to assist first-year students in adjusting to university expectations, acquiring essential academic success skills, and exploring different career paths. The course focuses on accessing university resources, and developing self-awareness, agency, and personal responsibility. Students will also become active members of the campus community.

Course Promises

This course makes a set of promises to you (assuming you fulfill the expectations below). By the end of the semester, you should be able to:

- 1. Exhibit growth in self-awareness, agency, and personal responsibility
- 2. Demonstrate knowledge and skills in quantitative reasoning
- 3. Adapt and apply appropriate academic strategies to courses and learning experiences
- 4. Identify and apply strategies to effectively manage time and priorities
- 5. Identify relevant academic policies, processes, and resources relevant to your academic success
- Develop goal-setting strategies to enhance academic and career readiness.

Course Expectations

This course will only fulfill these promises if you promise the following in return:

<u>Attend classes.</u> This course will rely largely on class content and discussion. For this format to succeed, you must be present <u>AND</u> on time. You will earn an absence if you arrive after the instructor has already taken roll. Excessive tardiness can lead to substantial grade loss. You will receive points for attendance and many in and out of class assignments will be contingent on information from class. To earn full participation points, you must attend class and actively

participate. You may miss up to four classes. Five absences may result in you being dropped from the course. The 4 absences may include quarantine and/or isolation for COVID-19. If you need to miss more than 4 days due to extracurricular activities, communication must be provided by your organization's coach or advisor/sponsor.

To be attentive and participate in class. I expect all students to actively participate during class both verbally and nonverbally. Participation does not simply mean speaking, although that is essential. I realize there are a variety of ways students can participate (e.g., following discussions with your eyes and ears, asking questions, sharing, reading, writing, individual reflection, presenting, collaboration). I hope that you will strive to stretch yourselves beyond your existing ways of learning and comfort zone. I encourage you to contribute thoughtful comments and questions, as well as to listen carefully to your peers' contributions and respectfully respond to others' comments. The success of our mutual learning from each other depends upon preparation and active participation in all aspects of the course. Be mindful of excessive phone as it disrupts your and others' learning in class and will work heavily against your overall participation grade. I expect all phones to be in bags and off desks. You are free to leave the room for any necessary phone use. You will lose significant points in overall participation grade if there is regular cell phone use in class.

<u>To complete required assignments in a timely manner.</u> Assignments provide you with both informal and formal opportunities to articulate your responses to the issues and topics we will discuss. You will get the most out of the course if you turn in your work on time. All late assignments will receive a zero. Extensions require at least a full day's advance notice prior to due dates and approval from me. The majority of assignments in this class will be submitted in written form such as reflections or responses to questions. It is vital that you follow basic grammar rules in order to get full credit for assignments. No matter how short or long the response, make sure you check for grammar and standards of academic writing. All responses are a reflection of you and are intended to prepare you for academic and professional writing.

Assignments, Presentations and Quizzes

To be successful in this course you are expected to complete all assignments on time. Assignments must be submitted to the correct location to be considered on time. Assignments will be graded based on quantity and quality with rubrics for each assignment provided in Blackboard.

Assignments will be mainly submitted in Blackboard with a couple posted on your ePortfolio; A&M-SA uses a platform called "Digication" for all students to have access to their own ePortfolio. Throughout the semester, you will reflect on various assignments, class activities and discussions. Through writing and visuals, you will demonstrate what you have achieved from actively participating in the FYS course.

Presentations will always be in class and following content instruction related to the material. Mini presentations can be individual or as a group. The final career presentations will be at the end of the semester and utilize the content from the career project.

Quizzes will be completed at home. They will be related to content from a class topic. You are free to use notes from class.

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance: According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. If Title IV funds are disbursed to ineligible students (including students who fail to begin attendance), the institution must return these funds to the U.S. DoE within 30 days of becoming aware that the student will not or has not begun attendance.
