**Catalog Course Description:** Structure of the options and futures markets and the trading system of derivatives. Options and futures pricing theory. Analysis of hedging strategies using options and futures. Role of options and futures trading strategies as part of portfolio management, performance evaluation and investment planning. TSI Restriction(s): Reading, Math, and Writing

**Course Objectives:** The objective of this course is to introduce the student to the subject of options and futures or more commonly referred to as derivatives. Students should therefore gain a knowledge of how options and futures are valued by investors and how the various securities can be used.

**Prerequisite(s):** FINC 4331.

**TSI Restriction(s):** Reading, Math, and Writing.

**Student Learning Outcomes:** After successful completion of this course, students will:

- 1. Understand the structure of the derivative securities market.
- 2. Be familiar with various types of derivative securities.
- 3. Know how to use various hedging strategies and calculate payoffs with derivative securities.
- 4. Be able to demonstrate how derivative securities are valued.
- 5. Demonstrate their understanding of the Value-At-Risk measure used by many financial institutions.

**AACSB Assessment:** The College of Business is in the process of applying for AACSB accreditation. **Examinations and Assessments:** The exams will consist of conceptual application true/false and multiple-choice questions, and problem solving questions. Failure to take an exam will result in a grade of zero for that exam and may result in a fail grade in the course. The exam materials will come from lectures, lecture notes, the text, and class discussions. Questions will emphasize understanding and applications of concepts and topics covered in class. *Exams and quizzes will be in Blackboard under Exams & Quizzes* 

**Assignments/ Research Papers:** There is no research paper for this course.

**Extra Credit:** There will not be any extra credit assignments for this course.

Make up and Late Assignment/Exam/Quiz Policy: Students are responsible for checking Blackboard for assignment due dates and times.
