BIOL 4360 Internship in Biology

Credits: 3 (0-0-3)

Internship in Biology is a course aimed at providing professional working experience in the field of biology. The sites at which students will be interns will be local and may be affiliated with the government, military, or private foundations. The student will be required to be a model employee and an exemplary ambassador of Texas A&M University-San Antonio. Students will be supervised by a site manager and by a faculty member. Students will be evaluated based on their work performance and a reflection paper describing their experience. TSI Restriction(s): Reading, Math, and Writing

Prerequisites: BIOL 1306, BIOL 1106, BIOL 1307, and BIOL 1107.

Restrictions: Graduate level students may not enroll.

Learning objectives

- 1. This course will provide an introductory experience working in a biomedical research laboratory setting with an emphasis on microbiology and immunology.
- 2. Students will also learn how to function in a laboratory setting.
- 3. Students will learn a few basic techniques and will learn how to record their observations.

Grading

Attendance: 40% (12-20 hours per week in lab or other acceptable research)

Reflection paper or presentation: 60% (2 to 4 page reflection piece on lab work/conclusion; poster/oral

presentation)
