BORDER SECURITY ISSUES SYLLABUS

Course Description

The CRIMINOLOGY 3357 course examines the cultural, historical, biographical, political, economic, and violence related border protection/security issues. The class will consist of lecture and student discussions on various border legal/social/national security topics. Through critical analysis, discussions, presentations, and research, students will trace, discuss, and report on the evolution of conventional border related criminal activity such as, human, drug, and weapons trafficking, cartel activity, terrorism, public corruption, gang activity, crimes against people, crimes against property, illegal immigration, bulk money transfers and money laundering, Latin American influence, the Mexican media, and border initiatives. Readings will include factual accounts of U.S Border States protection initiatives, current events and intelligence reports involving border violence, public corruption, and cartel influence as they relate to criminology, law enforcement, national security, and public media sources.

Course Objectives

1. To acquire a basic understanding of U.S./Mexico Border states security,

2. To evaluate and understand laws and social control along the U.S./Mexico border,

3. To review U.S./Mexico border legal cases,

4. To appreciate the challenges of border security and local, state, and federal criminal justice system legal processes,

5. To discuss informed legal opinion in U.S./Mexico border debates and issues,

6. To identify U.S./Mexico border legal customs, and

7. To recognize and appreciate the need for further legal research in U.S./Mexico Border security issues and policy.

General Education Goals

1. To enhance student's literacy skills through assigned readings, discussions, Exams, and written reports,

2. To increase student awareness of cultural and multi-cultural concerns through the study of U.S./Mexico border security issues and how they relate to and affect all cultures,

3. To develop and apply critical thinking and analytical skills as they relate to U.S./Mexico border security and various social/legal systems,

4. To identify and comprehend various U.S./Mexico border security issues and social factors that relate to law and the legal system and to understand their nexus, and

5. To prepare for more advanced study in law, national security, and the legal/criminal justice fields.

Assessment of Learning Outcomes

All outcomes will be assessed through a combination of quizzes/Blackboard assignments, exams, and a Written Report.

Evaluation of Student Performance

Examinations

There will be 3 exams during the semester including the final. Exams will consist of a combination of multiple choices, fill-in, true-false and short answer/essay questions.

Quizzes/Assignments

There will be random date quizzes/class assignments given during the course of the semester totaling 100 points. No makeup quizzes/class assignments will be given, i.e., if you are absent from class on the day of the random quizzes or class assignments, <mark>including the first day of class</mark>, POINTS CANNOT BE MADE UP.

Written Report

STUDENTS WILL SELECT A BORDER SECURITY ISSUE RELATED TOPIC and complete a written report. Additional instructions will be provided in class. The report shall contain a minimum of 1,000 words, **NOT** including the cover page, abstract, and reference page. You are to annotate the total number of words in **the report on page 2.** The report **shall comply** with the APA writing style for paper format, abstract, cover page, citations, headings, and references. The link to the required APA formatting style is: **www.apastyle.org**. Go to "Learning APA Style" and to the free tutorial, "The Basics of APA Style." While current events and media sources will likely be major contributors to class discussions, students will be required to use no less than three (3) *academic* resources for the written report. WIKIPEDIA AND OTHER NON-ACADEMIC REFERENCES SHALL NOT BE USED AS ACADEMIC, CREDIBLE REFERENCES FOR THE WORK. The final report shall be electronically submitted as a WORD document into Blackboard at the date and time provided in class. The file name shall contain the student's last name. A written report **grading rubric** is included in this Syllabus. Please review it carefully, as it clearly defines the written report grading structure. Word counts will be verified.

Following instructions and writing are critical skills in Criminal Justice.

Late Assignments - Late assignments receive a 25% deduction if not received by the date and time shown in the syllabus schedule. <u>Assignments more than one day</u> <u>late will not be accepted</u>. Technological issues are not considered valid grounds for late assignment submission. Prior to submitting to Blackboard, <u>save your work</u>, as there have been instances where students submitted their work and no documents were found, other than the recorded attempt to submit. If this occurs, I will direct you to resubmit your work to my Texas A&M - SA email account (ralonzo@tamusa.edu).

Class Participation/Topic Discussion

Students will be expected to participate in class discussions and provide current, relevant and informed academic discourse on assigned Border Security Issue (BSI) topics. This requires student's knowledge of current events, individual research on BSI issues discussed, and staying current with assigned readings.

<mark>Academic Dishonesty</mark>

Campus Carry

As many of you know, campus carry is in effect. All faculty members were trained on these new laws. Based on that training, there are two issues I want to review: The first is that anyone carrying a weapon on campus must keep that weapon concealed (unless a licensed peace officer; badge/credentials should be readily visible if a peace officer's weapon is exposed. The second is that there are legal limitations on what I am allowed to ask a student. These two aspects of the law create the potential for misunderstanding, especially as we all adjust to the new policies. My job is to ensure that the law is complied with, and that each student's rights are protected, so this will be my classroom policy: • If you carry a gun, you must keep it concealed. • If I see a gun, I will notify campus police. By law they have the authority to demand you to present your License to Carry; I do not. • If you see a gun, please feel free to talk with me. Please do not ask the student whether or not he or she is licensed, etc. Also, please remember that seeing the outline of a gun through clothing is not considered

"seeing" the gun. • If you hear a student threaten to harm themselves or another person, contact the A&M-SA Police Department immediately. You can also make a report using the CARE program. • If you have a License to carry, please follow all safety recommendations. Our campus police department is stressing the importance of a safe holster and the danger of an unintentional discharge of un-holstered guns stored in purses or book bags.

<u>COVID-19 Addendum</u>

<u>Self-monitoring</u>: Take time each day before coming to campus to self-monitor for COVID-19 symptoms and use the Reporting Portal should you test positive.

<u>Vaccinations</u>: Students and employees will continue to be informed about community vaccination resources and on-campus opportunities as they occur.

<u>Safety</u>: We encourage you to wear a mask when the situation warrants doing so or if you remain unvaccinated. Everyone should wash hands frequently and avoid close contact and large crowds.

SPRING 2024 GUIDELINES

General safety and health protocols:

Face-to-face classes have been scaled up, and we will continue to deliver instruction in a variety of modes, including hybrid and fully online.

Face-to-face classrooms will be routinely cleaned throughout each day. Each evening all classrooms will be cleaned using hydrostatic technology.

Rigorous routine cleaning of frequently used surfaces (e.g., door handles, handrails, light switches, and faucets) will continue throughout each day by dedicated custodial crew members.

Sanitation carts with supplies will remain in classrooms and large gathering areas.

Plexiglass and sneeze guards will remain in place.

HVAC filtration with MERV 13 filters and increased air exchanges will remain operable.

Drinking fountains will remain disabled, but the bottle-filling function at water fountains will remain operational.

Testing and self-reporting tools:

The on-campus COVID-19 Testing Center will remain open Monday through Friday from 9 a.m.–noon and from 1–4 p.m.

Employees and students are required to continue to self-monitor and self-report COVID-19 symptoms and exposure (see "Reporting Portal" tab).

Case management, monitoring, and exposure guidance:

The COVID-19 Monitoring Committee will continue to conduct weekly reviews of campus case numbers for COVID-19 to assess campus risks and potential changes to status, providing operational recommendations to the President.

Weekly reports will continue to be posted (see "COVID Cases" tab).

Case management and contact tracing will continue with the support of the University's case management team.

COVID-19 cases or exposure will continue to require isolation and quarantine measures.

Pandemic updates and emergency communications:

Regular safety and emergency communication will continue using official A&M-San Antonio channels. These include digital monitors, emails, text alerts, campus signage, and this website.

The University will continue to provide updates based on risk assessments to help guide operations.

Events and spaces:

Improvements have been made to spaces that host large group events to enhance virtual and hybrid experiences, including Vista Room (Central Academic Building), Auditorium, and Ceremony Room (Patriots' Casa).

Additional outdoor furniture has been procured and will arrive during the Spring semester.

Spaces used for events will continue to be cleaned following COVID-19 protocols, including sanitation of technology such as handheld mics.
