Catalog Description. Students will study topics from college algebra (linear equations, quadratic equations, functions and graphs, inequalities), mathematics of finance (simple and compound interest, annuities), linear programming, matrices, systems of linear equations, and applications to management, business and social sciences. This course meets the standards for the Mathematics category of courses under the core curriculum.

Prerequisites. Evidence of math equivalent to High School Algebra II (“C” or higher) or placement; Requires passing TSIA Math score.

Required Material. Online access code for Mathematics with Applications in the Management, Natural & Social Sciences by Lail, Hungerford, Holcomb (13th edition), Pearson Publishing. ISBN: 9780-137892198; 9780-137891870 (E-book included with access code).

Attendance Policy. Attending class is mandatory. In all cases of absences and tardiness or leaving early, students will be held responsible for completion of course requirements covered in their absence. Students are expected to attend class as scheduled and be prepared to participate in discussions, in-class exercises. If you miss class, you are responsible for finding out what you missed on that day. You are welcome to ask questions on the topics that you missed; however, it is your responsibility to learn the material. You are strongly encouraged to attend all classes. In addition, if an unavoidable situation prevents you from being on time or if you must leave early, please minimize class interruption. After 6 absences, you can be dropped for non-attendance by your instructor without further notice.

Calculator Policy. Only scientific calculators are permitted. Some topics may be covered with the assistance of a graphing calculator. Online math utilities (e.g., Desmos) are not allowed on exams. Note: Laptops, cell phones, and other mobile devices are NOT acceptable calculators.

Homework. All homework assignments will be assigned weekly and completed through Pearson’s MyMathLab. You may access MyMathLab via Blackboard.

Quizzes. There will be 11 quizzes in total which will be completed on MyMathLab. All due dates are listed in MML. Quizzes may be attempted three times, and each quiz attempt has a time limit. Only the highest score will be counted. Students should attempt the quiz multiple times in order to be prepared for the unit test.

Examination. There will be 3 exams and a comprehensive Final exam. All exams will be in person and administered in class. Unless under extreme circumstances, there will be **no make-up** for exams. Please make sure to coordinate with the instructor **at least 24 hours prior** to the scheduled date and time of the exam. At the end of the semester, the lowest exam grade will be replaced with the final exam grade.

Late Work. Late homework submissions will not be accepted. The workload distribution would be in such a way that will allow sufficient time for completion of each assignment.

Student Learning Outcomes. MATH 1324 helps students develop critical thinking, communication, and empirical and quantitative skills by focusing on student understanding of key algebraic concepts to include recognizing, identifying, solving, analyzing, and explaining applications of various mathematical functions in management, economics, and business problems. Upon completion of this course, students will:

1. Apply elementary functions, including linear, quadratic, polynomial, rational, logarithmic, and exponential functions to solve and interpret real-world problems.
2. Recognize and solve mathematics of finance problems, including the computation of interest, annuities, and amortization of loans.
3. Apply and explain basic matrix operations, including linear programming methods, to solve application (business) problems.
4. Demonstrate fundamental probability techniques and application of those techniques, including expected value, to solve problems.
5. Interpret and apply matrix techniques and probability analyses to model applications to management, economics, and business problems.

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance. According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. If Title IV funds are disbursed to ineligible students (including students who fail to begin attendance), the institution must return these funds to the U.S. DoE within 30 days of becoming aware that the student will not or has not begun attendance. A non-punitive drop does not affect the student’s GPA. However, course drops that exceed the maximum allowed by SB 1231 will be treated as “F” grades and will impact the student’s GPA.
