Catalog Course Description: The design of this course is centered on developing an understanding of the basic financial statement of a firm. In turn we will use this knowledge to apply basic tools used for analyzing a firm's performance. Thus, the course will focus on using various ratios to show how well a corporation is progressing in terms of reaching financial objectives. The course will also provide students with the ability to use forecasts to develop an estimate of firm valuation.

Course Objectives: The primary objective of this course is to provide students with the necessary tools to understand the profitability of a firm, to evaluate the risks to a firm, and use information to forecast future profitability and risk and ultimately the value of a firm. The course will focus on the use of a variety of financial ratios and accounting statements to develop an understanding of a firm's value and risk characteristics.

Prerequisites: Grade C or better in ACCT 3301/ACCT 3302 or equivalent.

Student Learning Outcomes: The specific student learning objectives of this course are to

(A) Demonstrate the ability to use various financial ratios and accounting statements to evaluate a firm.

(B) Create a viable proforma income statement, balance sheet and statement of cash flow for a firm.

(C) Demonstrate an understanding of the framework used to link the economic characteristics and strategies of a firm, its financial statements, and assess a firm's current and forecasted profitability and risks.

(D) Demonstrate an understanding of how to use financial statement information to forecast the future business activities of the firm.

(E) Develop the ability to use and connect the various financial ratios and information for a firm in order to construct a realistic value for the overall firm.

AACSB Assessment: The College of Business is in the process of applying for AACSB accreditation. As part of that process, students will be assessed on program level outcomes based on course outcomes from various courses. The materials from this course may be used for assessing such program level outcomes, and hence students must follow the necessary rigor to ensure mastery and retention of the above course outcomes.

Students are required to read related chapters from the textbook before the class.

- **Time:** You are expected to spend 2-4 hours per week for the course. Based on the background, some student may require more time. Time spent may be longer when assignment/exams are due.

Other Recommended / Reading Materials: Students should keep current with various business news through such publications as the Wall Street Journal, The Economist, and various news programs. The latter would include Fox Business News, Bloomberg TV, and the nightly business report on NPR.

Course Requirements every student must fulfill in order to succeed in course:

1. Students should check the Course Calendar, Announcements, and Emails on a regular basis.
2. Students should keep current with all course assignments, quizzes, and examinations.
3. If the course uses remote proctoring for exams, students must schedule their exam early in the semester.
4. Students should ask questions and communicate with the instructor online.

Grading Policy: The final course grade will be based on your performance on the exams, assignments and attendance using the following weights:

The final letter grades will be assigned as follows: Above 90% \Rightarrow A; 80 – 89.99% \Rightarrow B; 70 – 79.99% \Rightarrow C; 60 – 69.99% \Rightarrow D; Below 60% \Rightarrow F.

If you missed more than one-fourth of the classes, your final grade will be adjusted to one letter lower. If you missed more than 50% of the classes, your final grade will be F.

The instructor reserves the right to adjust the student's final grade based on the overall performance.

Examinations: There will be two mandatory mid-term exams and a mandatory final. The exams/quizzes will consist of conceptual multiple-choice questions and problem-solving questions. The exam/quiz materials will come from lecture notes, the text, and class discussions. Questions will emphasize understanding and applications of concepts and topics covered in class. **Missing an exam will result in a grade of zero for that exam and may result in a fail grade in the course.**

Proctored Exams: Examinations in this class may/will be administered using secure online testing services. Details regarding proctored test sign up and administration will be provided at least 2 weeks prior to the exam.

Experiential Learning Assignment: Students will use financial statements of S&P 500 companies to write analyst reports by applying the analyzing skills and knowledge that they learn from the course.

Make up and Late Assignment/exam/quiz policy: As a general rule, make-ups or late submissions will NOT be offered or accepted for any missed assignments/exams/quizzes. Late submissions or make-ups may be accepted/administered only in extra-ordinary circumstances such as an excused official university activity, a severe illness, or a dire emergency. However, you must provide comprehensive documentation either before or within a few days of the missed assignment/quiz/exam.

Generative Artificial Intelligence (AI): ACCT3338 assumes that all work submitted by students will be generated by the students themselves, working individually or in groups. Students should not have another person/entity do the writing of any portion of an assignment for them, which includes hiring a person or a company to write assignments and/or using artificial intelligence (AI) tools like ChatGPT. Use of any AI-generated content in this course qualifies as academic dishonesty and violates Texas A&M-San Antonio's standards of academic integrity.

Course Drop Policy: You may drop the course on or before **April 21, 2025** with an automatic grade of W. If you wish to drop the class after that date, you will receive either a W (if you have satisfactory record so far) or F. The last date to drop a course or withdraw from the University is **April 28, 2025**.

If you wish to drop the class, you must submit the necessary paperwork to the proper authority.

Class conduct and civility code: Everyone in class is expected to follow all rules in the student handbook, as well as common courtesy during classroom lectures and discussions online, including the following:

The course covers a lot of material and most students find at least some parts of it difficult. The course is intensive and challenging and you are expected to master the materials presented in class. The structure of the class makes your individual study and preparation outside of class extremely important. Reading the assigned chapter(s) and having some familiarity with them before class will be very useful for understanding lectures.

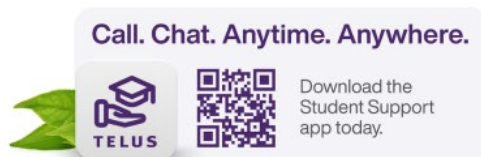
