Course Description:

This course focuses on developing and applying appropriate, differentiated instructional strategies that will help teachers more effectively engage all students in optimal learning experiences. The course will examine and critique various pedagogical strategies that are intended to create a positive and rich learning environment for a diverse population of students. In addition, students in this course will reflect on their own instructional practices to determine best practices that will work to meet students' needs and ensure student success.

Prerequisite:

Acceptance into Texas A&M University – San Antonio Graduate School and the Department of Curriculum and Instruction master's program.

Course Objectives:

- Introduce the terms and concepts related to differentiated instruction.
- Expose students to current research on differentiated instruction and provide opportunities to apply new knowledge.
- Facilitate the application of differentiation in instructional planning and lesson internalization.
- Emphasize the importance of recognizing and identifying student readiness.
- Promote professional reflection and follow-through actions.
