Course Description:

This course will introduce, examine, and analyze major issues regarding crime and justice policies. Specifically, the course introduces social issues that are currently affecting the criminal justice system in the United States. This course emphasizes a conceptual understanding of the creation, implementation, and evaluation of the criminal justice policies.

Prerequisites: CRIM 1301, CRIM 2330, & ENGL 1302

Course Learning Objectives:

- By the end of this course, students should be able to:
 - o Identify the current practices and functions of the criminal justice system.
 - Assess the negative and positive impacts of criminal justice policies.
 - O Describe the functions of the social institutions connected to crime, (e.g., politics, media, education, family, etc.).
 - o Evaluate a criminal justice policy.

Assessments

Attendance:

You are expected to attend EVERY class and actively participate in class discussions and activities. If you must miss class, please let me know beforehand with proper documentation. During class, we will have in-class handouts, discussions, and pop-quizzes. If you miss class, you are responsible for catching up with the class on your own. Chapter notes of the textbook will be provided on BlackBoard in case you miss a class. If you miss a class without a proper documentation, there will be no late submissions of assignments.

Pop Quizzes (150pts):

There will be multitude of quizzes randomly distributed throughout the semester. This is to promote student attendance. The number of quizzes and its point values will be determined by the instructor's discretion.

Participation (150pts):

You are expected to fully participate in class exercises. Be ready to answer the questions that I will ask you during class. This course will be heavily discussion-based lecture. Students actively participating in the class discussion will receive points based on the quality of the discussion. Participation activeness and discussion quality will be determined by the instructor's discretion.

Exams (150pts):

You will have three exams throughout the semester. Each exam will be worth 50 pts. The contents of the exams will be from the lecture.

Group Presentations (50pts):

Students will present one group presentation that consists of 3 members (You pick who you want to work with). A group will be assigned a date via random draw. They will prepare a 21–30-minute (minimum of 7 minutes each – will be timed) presentation that will be discussed by the entire class afterwards. Each group will pick their own topic (cannot overlap with the topic we cover in class) and must be preapproved by the instructor. Detailed instructions regarding the presentation will be provided in Blackboard.

Final Exam (TBD):

Final exam will be administered (may or may not) based on the instructor's discretion. Final exam is cumulative and will take place during the scheduled final exam time.

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV



funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. If Title IV funds are disbursed to ineligible students (including students who fail to begin attendance), the institution must return these funds to the U.S. DoE within 30 days of becoming aware that the student will not or has not begun attendance. Faculty will provide the Office of Financial Aid with an electronic notification if a student has not attended the first week of class.
