Course Description (from the A&M-SA Course Catalog)

This course is designed to assist first-year students in adjusting to university expectations through enhancing quantitative reasoning skills and acquiring essential skills for academic success. *Text(s)*: There is no required text for this class.

Course Overview

Offered in partnership with your high school and the Texas A&M University's Department of University Access, this course is designed to assist early college dual credit high school students in adjusting to university expectations, acquiring essential academic success skills, enhancing quantitative reasoning skills, and exploring different career paths. The course focuses on accessing university resources, and developing self-awareness, the ability to advocate for yourself, and personal responsibility. Students will also become aware of how to be active in a college setting and be familiar with what university life is.

Course Promises

This course makes a set of promises to you (assuming you fulfill the expectations below). By the end of the semester, you should be able to:

- 1. Exhibit growth in self-awareness, self-advocacy, and personal responsibility
- 2. Demonstrate knowledge and skills in quantitative reasoning
- 3. Adapt and apply appropriate academic strategies to courses and learning experiences.
- 4. Identify and apply strategies to effectively manage time and priorities.
- Identify relevant academic policies, processes, and resources relevant to your academic success
- 6. Identify career paths and resources to building a successful high school experience that ultimately leads to success in college.

Course Expectations

This course will only fulfill these promises if you promise the following in return:

Attend classes. This course will rely largely on class content and discussion. For this format to succeed, you must be present AND on time. You will receive points for attendance and many in and out of class assignments will be contingent on information from class. To earn full participation points, you must attend class and actively participate. You may miss up to four classes without penalty. Five absences may result in you being dropped from the course. Beyond the fourth absence, you will lose 10 points from the attendance grade (out of 100 points or 10% of your grade) for each time you are absent. If you come more than 15 minutes late or leave more than 10 minutes early before class is dismissed, you did not attend class fully that day and you will be counted absent even if you attended a portion of our class.

To be attentive and participate in class.

Active participation is a critical part of this course. Whether students are extremely outgoing, reserved, or somewhere in between, we must all hear from each other in the classroom. This includes louder voices understanding when to allow others the opportunity to speak and be heard.

Participation does not simply mean speaking, although that is a crucial part of engagement in this class. Students may participate by: active listening, asking questions, sharing experiences, reading, writing, presenting, collaborating, individual reflection, etc.

I hope that you will strive to stretch yourselves beyond your preferred ways of learning and your comfort zone. I encourage you to contribute thoughtful comments and questions, as well as to listen carefully to your peers' contributions and respectfully respond to others' comments. The success of our mutual learning from each other depends upon preparation and active participation in all aspects of the course.

10% of your grade in this course is derived from your PER grade: Participation, Engagement, & Respect. Near the mid-term, the class will be assigned a common PER grade that reflects the overall level of participation, engagement, and respect. At the end of the term, these PER grades will be individualized, including points subtracted or added back, if applicable.

Disruptive, disrespectful, or otherwise detrimental behavior for this academic environment will not be tolerated, and students behaving as such will be removed.

To complete required assignments by the assigned deadline. Assignments provide you with both informal and formal opportunities to articulate your responses to the issues and topics we will discuss. You will get the most out of the course if you turn in your work on time. Most assignments in this class will involve reflective writing. It is vital that you follow basic grammar rules in order to get full credit for assignments. No matter how short or long the response, make sure you check for grammar and standards of academic writing. Also, explain why or provide support for your thoughts when appropriate. All responses reflect you and are intended to prepare you for academic and professional writing that you will use both in high school and college.

Late Work Policy: Except for the final project, the following policy applies to late work: I will clearly state the deadline for each assignment in class. Assignments are due when class starts on the due date. Assignments not turned in on time will lose 10% off the maximum possible points per week late. If something is occurring that is preventing you from consistently submitting work on time, please see the instructor to discuss the matter confidentially and determine how to proceed. <u>Turning in work your work is vital to your success in this class. It is difficult to pass the class without completing your work.</u>

Assignments and Evaluations

To be successful in this course you are expected to complete all assignments on time. Assignments must be submitted to the correct location to be considered on time. Assignments will be graded based on quantity and quality with rubrics for each assignment provided in Blackboard.

Please note that I will grade the item you submit. If you make a mistake, please upload a new file and resubmit the assignment as soon as possible. I will grade the latest assignment you submitted. Once I grade the submission, revisions are not accepted unless I give you approval to resubmit.
