Course Description:

This course is an introduction to the historical and existing procedures of the federal government within the United States. The American political system will be lectured on, analyzed over within this course. Throughout the course students will learn numerous facts to better articulate insightful responses toward the various issues occurring within American politics. Students will be also expected to practice their writing & critical thinking skills as they define and apply these topics throughout the semester.

Student Learning Objectives:

1. Understand and explain the origins and continual development of the U.S. constitution.
2. Describe separation of powers and checks and balances in American government, in both theory and practice.
3. Demonstrate knowledge of the legislative, executive, and judicial branches within the political system.
4. Evaluate the roles public opinion, interest groups, and political parties play.
5. Analyze the U.S. nomination and election process and as well as the role of mass media.
6. Describe the rights and responsibilities of the American citizenry.
7. Examine issues, policies, and political culture within the United States.

Online Quizzes: Quizzes will be made available online via Blackboard. They will consist of multiple-choice questions concerning key terms and concepts for the given chapter of that week. You will have 35 minutes to complete the quiz and may use your textbook. You must work alone.

Online Exams: Exams will include a variety of questions (essay questions, some multiple choice) and will evaluate your knowledge of both the readings assigned as well as the materials covered in class lectures. It is expected you put your critical thinking skills to work. The exam will be essay-heavy, therefore, grammar, spelling, sentence structure, etc. will be crucial in obtaining the highest grade possible. The exam will have a time limit, and you must download **Respondus Lockdown** at the beginning of the semester in order to access each exam; this will lockdown your browser to prevent cheating. This is NOT an open-book exam. [Lowest regular exam grade will be dropped].

Blackboard Discussion Questions: Weekly discussions within the “discussion” tab within your Blackboard course page consist of a two-step process: You will be asked key discussion questions weekly and must provide a *thorough paragraph answer* that would constitute a half a page. These discussion question responses **MUST** be typed in YOUR OWN WORDS (not the authors) and must utilize political science terminology and insight. These responses will be helpful in preparing you for future exam essay questions. **NOTE:** For full credit, you must respond to 1 of your classmates' responses. Be sure to comment on their main point and insert your perspective on whether you agree or disagree and why. **NOTE: DO NOT USE QUOTES FROM YOUR TEXTBOOK &** be sure to watch your grammar, sentence structure, spelling, capitalization.

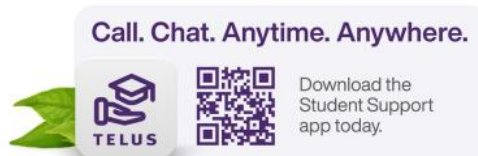

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance: According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. If Title IV funds are disbursed to ineligible students (including students who fail to begin attendance), the institution must return these funds to the U.S. DoE within 30 days of becoming aware that the student will not or has not begun attendance. Faculty will provide the Office of Financial Aid with an electronic notification if a student has not attended the first week of class. SB 1231 limits students to a maximum of six (6) non-punitive course drops (i.e., courses a student chooses to drop) during their undergraduate careers. A non-punitive drop does not affect the student’s GPA. However, course drops that exceed the maximum allowed by SB 1231 will be treated as “F” grades and will impact the student’s GPA.

Students' Responsibilities

1. A student has the responsibility to respect the rights and property of others, including other students, the faculty, and administration.
