Catalog Course Description: This foundational course will help students develop an understanding of leadership theory while acquiring the necessary skills and insights to become effective leaders. The course blends theory and application and integrates contemporary ideas and practices with established scholarly research. Students will examine the roles of self-leadership, and the binding relationships between leader and followers. The course considers how power, courage, vision, and morality influence leadership. TSI Restrictions: Math

Prerequisites: Completion of the College of Business prerequisites, MGMT 3325.

Student Learning Outcomes: After successful completion of this course, students will be able to:

- 1. Evaluate various contemporary leadership theories
- Explore the personal and relationship associations of an effective leader
- 3. Assess their personal strengths and weaknesses as a leader
- 4. Construct a personal definition of leadership and their leadership philosophy

AACSB Assessment:

The College of Business received AACSB accreditation in Spring 2023. As part of that ongoing process, students will be assessed on program level outcomes based on course outcomes from various courses. The materials from this course may be used for assessing such program level outcomes, and hence students must follow the necessary rigor to ensure mastery and retention of the above course outcomes.

The text (textbook or e-book) is ALL that is required, and can be accessed via BryteWave (TAMUSA's Access Program digital version) (Cengage publisher activities are not required for this class.)
- Blackboard: Connect to http://tamusa.blackboard.com. You will have lecture notes, solutions to problems, multimedia materials and other supplementary materials in Blackboard. All class communications will be through Blackboard and students should monitor this several times a day.
- **Time Expectation for Coursework:** You are expected to spend a minimum of 4-8 hours per week on the course. Based on the background, some students may require more time. Time spent may be longer when assignment/exams are due.

Other Recommended / Reading Materials: Additional reading materials are available on the course website as recommended by the instructor.

Course Requirements every student must fulfill in order to succeed in course:

- 1. Students should check the Course Calendar, Announcements, and Messages (email) systems in **Blackboard** on a regular basis.
- 2. Students should stay current with all course assignments, quizzes, and exams.
- 3. If the course uses remote proctoring for exams, students must schedule their exam early in the semester.
- 4. Students should ask questions and communicate with the instructor either in class, online, off-line or during office hours.
- 5. For all classwork, exams, quizzes etc., if a student is completing it off-campus, then they are responsible for availability of internet connectivity. Extensions will not be granted for lack of availability of internet connections.
- **6.** Students should remember that hybrid and online courses assume greater responsibility and independent learning skills by the student for their own learning outcomes.

The final letter grades will be assigned as follows: Above 90% = A; 80 - 89% = B; 70 - 79% = C; 60 - 69% = D; Below 60% = F.

Online Activities: There will independent learning activities including textbook readings, discussion board, chapter videos, and other items. Students are expected to read the designated chapters and engage on the material presented. To encourage reflection and application, self-assessments will be assigned and discussed through uploaded presentations. BlackBoard will be utilized in this course to assist students with independent learning of the subject.

Discussion Boards: Weekly discussion boards are posted on BlackBoard, generally around the Chapter and Self-Assessment assignments for that week. **ONE original posting and TWO responses are required for each Discussion Board forum**. In other words, post your own findings and answers, then respond to two of your classmates' postings. This is the "participation" component for sharing of insights and information for this online class – so, thoughtful posts and responses will help others through different perspectives and experiences!

Student Presentations: Students are assigned a specific date for a presentation on an assigned topic or question. **Upload a narrated PowerPoint presentation**, be familiar with your computer's microphone and PowerPoint presentation capabilities. Allow approximately 10 minutes for the presentation, include a photo of yourself on the initial slide along with a brief introduction to yourself, and conclude two (2) meaningful questions to assess your audience's understanding or gain their insights on the topic. Schedule for presentations will be posted on BlackBoard / Course Content page, and presentations will be uploaded as part of the recorded WebEx session each week.

Student Reflections Presentations: Students are assigned a specific date to share their final reflections on the top three insights gained from this course. This will be a conversation rather than a formal presentation, but you will use the narrated PowerPoint format for this presentation as well. Students will have 2-3 minutes to share their insights with their classmates. Upload the narrated PowerPoint into the BlackBoard link for grading.

Examinations / Quizzes: Students will be assessed through chapter quizzes which will address the concepts and theories discussed over the semester. The quizzes will available through **BlackBoard**.

Reflection Paper: The final semester paper will reflect on the totality of the course including assessing yourself as a leader and establishing a plan for improving your leadership skills, based on the semester's self-assessment exercises. As a part of this activity, each student will: develop a personally meaningful definition of leadership, create a personal leadership philosophy, examine their own strengths and weaknesses relative to effective leadership, draft a personal leadership development plan. Further details and instructions are posted on BlackBoard and

discussed in class. All work should be submitted through the respective Blackboard assignment link.

Make up and Late Assignment/exam/quiz policy:

Students needing extra time may submit assignments up to one week after the assignment due date. Students who submit work late will receive a penalty of 10% applied to the grade achieved on the late assignment.

Assignments more than one week late will be accepted if the student has made prior arrangements with the professor. Students who do not meet the agreed-upon deadline will receive a grade of zero on the assignment. Late work without prior arrangement will be accepted in the case of extenuating circumstances (such as hospitalization, childbirth, major accident, injury, or bereavement). Students who suffer such a circumstance must notify the instructor as soon as possible. In these instances, the instructor may waive the late penalty.

Students must submit the final assignment no later than the last day of the term. BlackBoard closes at 11:59 pm on the last day of the term, and no assignments are accepted after the last day of the term.

Class conduct and civility code: Everyone in class is expected to follow all rules in the student handbook, as well as common courtesy during classroom lectures and discussions in class and online, including the following:

- 1. It is the students' responsibility to obtain and be able to use the required materials and software for this class.
- 2. Student must retain copies of all assignments and graded work for verification purposes and provide it to the instructor, if necessary. Keep own copies of all computer files and e-mails till final grade is received.
- 3. For any questions about the exams and assignments, a student should contact the instructor, well in advance of the day they are due, so the instructor may have enough time to provide feedback.
- 4. All communications will be via e-mail communications to the Texas A&M University e-mail account, and students are expected to use their school provided email account. The instructor will reply to a student e-mail messages and voice messages within 24 hours during week days (Monday-Friday).
- 5. All assignment submissions must be uploaded to Blackboard by the due date and time. Submission window may close or marked late, even if late by one second.

Anyone violating these policies may be subject to disciplinary actions.

Class attendance and Participation: Students are responsible for the materials covered in the syllabus. The course covers a lot of material and most students find at least some parts of it difficult. Class participation will be evaluated through discussion boards, presentations to make the class more interesting and enhance the learning experience. Students are strongly encouraged

to ask questions, participate in topic discussions and problem solving through your presentations, and visit/contact the instructor during office hours in case of questions or concerns. Good attendance and participation will be rewarded when final grades are assigned.

The course is intensive and challenging and you are expected to master the materials presented in class. The structure of the class makes your individual study and preparation outside of class extremely important, and may vary considerably based on student background. However, a **minimum** of two hours of work outside the class is expected for every one hour of class period per week. Reading the assigned chapter(s) and having some familiarity with them before class will be very useful for understanding lectures.
