COURSE DESCRIPTION:

An exploration of piano proficiency through a diverse selection of styles, repertoire, and performance techniques.

COURSE GOALS:

- Learn and perform level-appropriate repertoire
- Refine sightreading, transposition, and/or harmonization skills
- Demonstrate applied music theory through technical exercises

MATERIALS AND OTHER RESOURCES:

- Music scores will be provided by the instructor.
- Pencil
- Folder with pockets to collect and organize print materials for easy accessibility
- Access to an acoustic piano or full-sized electronic piano with weighted keys and pedal

ATTENDANCE:

- Due to the customized nature of the course, weekly attendance is mandatory. In the event of a necessary absence, the student must provide notice to the instructor well in advance. Failure to notify the instructor of an absence will result in a grade reduction.
- Weekly meetings may or may not be rescheduled at the discretion of the instructor.

ASSESSMENT:

- Weekly meetings = 80%
 The instructor will assess progress each week during the regularly scheduled meeting time and introduce new concepts and materials as appropriate. Students are expected to take an active role in this process.
- Journal = 10%
 Practice is the key to success and students should plan to practice a minimum of four days each week, not counting the day of instruction. Students will submit a weekly journal entry that tracks their practice habits and identifies questions or concerns.
- Performance presentation = 10%
 Students will give a brief performance presentation of repertoire for a selected audience.

- 80% to 89% = B
- 70% to 79% = C
- 60% to 69% = D
- Below 60% = F
