COURSE DESCRIPTION: This course is the third in a Humanities Initiative learning community themed around Culture, Water, and Life en La Frontera. The class will introduce students to a variety of dramatic works from a range of time periods and regions, including early modern England and the contemporary US–Mexico Borderlands. We will pay special attention to the ways that plays are adapted and performed to fit new contexts and to speak to current concerns, including questions of identity, language, culture, and power. Broadly, we will think about the power of art and performance to address social, ecological, and cultural issues.

Of particular interest will be Shakespeare appropriations set and staged in the U.S.-Mexico Borderlands that engage with the Indigenous and colonial histories that have shaped the region. These plays are collected in <u>The Bard in the Borderlands: An Anthology of Shakespeare Appropriations en La Frontera</u>, edited by Drs. Gillen and Santos and their collaborator Dr. Kathryn Vomero Santos. As part of the Humanities Program's emphasis on transformative

texts and projects, students will meet a playwright whose work appears in this anthology and will have the opportunity to participate (as an actor, actor director, stage manager, or set designer, etc.) in a class performance derived from one of the plays.
