Course Description and Material

Catalog Description: A study of basic algebraic structures with applications from algebraic or analytic number theory. Topics include properties of integers, prime factorization, congruences, groups, subgroups, quotient groups, homomorphisms, integral domains and rings. Math 4340 helps students develop Critical Thinking, Communication, and Empirical and Quantitative Skills by focusing on student understanding of key concepts and appropriate applications of modern algebra.

Prerequisite: Math 3325 and one of the following: Math 3415, Math 3370, Math 3340, Math 4341; all Prerequisite(s) require a grade of "C" or higher.

Student Learner Objectives: Upon completion of this course, you will be able to:

- Demonstrate understanding and knowledge of properties of groups, which include groups, cyclic groups, cosets, subgroups, symmetric groups, normal subgroups, group homomorphisms, quotient groups, and group actions.
- Demonstrate understanding and knowledge of properties of rings, which include rings, domains, ring homomorphisms, ideals, and fields.
- Demonstrate the ability of applying mathematical proving techniques in simple modern algebra problems.
- Appreciate and understand the foundation of modern algebra.

List of Topics: Topics to be covered include but are not limited to the following:

- Chapter 0 Preliminaries.
- Chapters 1~3 Groups; finite groups; subgroups.
- Chapters 4~5 Cyclic groups; permutation groups.
- Chapters 6&10 Group homomorphisms and isomorphisms.
- Chapter 7 Cosets and Lagrange's Theorem.
- Chapter 8 External direct products.
- Chapter 9 Normal subgroups and factor groups.
- Chapter 11 Fundamental theorem of finite abelian groups.
- Chapters 12~15 Rings, domains, ideals, and ring homomorphisms.

The instructor reserves the right to modify/update the topics as appropriate.

NOTE: This class meets twice a week. Aside from the three hours that you spend in class each week, you should devote at least another 4~6 hours to studying on your own: reading the book and my lecture notes, working out your homework assignments, and solving some extra related problems for practice etc. You are responsible for all materials/topics discussed in this class.

Active Learning and Inquiry Based Learning: This course implements active learning and inquiry-based learning approaches throughout, and you are strongly encouraged to preview the teaching materials and be aware of many inclass participation and self/group study activities.

Course Expectations and Requirements

Class Attendance: Your active participation strengthens our learning community, and your questions and perspectives help everyone develop deeper understanding. I encourage you to attend classes regularly and be prepared to participate in discussions, in-class exercises, and problem presentations. Class attendance is taken at the beginning or at the end of each class. In addition, if an unavoidable situation prevents you from being on time or if you must leave early, please minimize class interruption.

Quizzes: There will be a 15~20-minute in-class quiz emphasizing the most recently covered topics roughly every two weeks, and there will be around 6 in total where only the best 5 of them will be counted as portion for your final grades.

Examinations: There will be three exams throughout the semester, each administered at the scheduled time. Exceptions may be made for legitimate reasons, but they must be approved by me. If you are unable to attend an exam, you must notify me formally within 24 hours of the scheduled exam time. In certain circumstances, someone else may notify me on your behalf. You will need to provide a valid reason for your absence, along with supporting documentation. You can notify me either via email or in person with a written notice. If you know in advance that you will be unable to take the exam at the regular time, please contact me ahead of time to make alternative arrangements. Failure to follow this procedure will result in a **GRADE OF ZERO** for the missed exam.

The schedules will be announced at least a week ahead of time when the time comes both on Blackboard and via email. They can be either in-class 75-minutes exams, taken home projects, and/or hybrid.

Test 1 covers Chapter 0~4 (only selected important topics).

Test 2 covers Chapters 5~11 (only selected important topics).

Final exam is comprehensive (only selected important topics).

NOTE: Graphic TI-83 or higher calculators, cell phones, laptops, i-pads, kindles, and any other electronic or mobile devices will absolutely be **NOT** allowed during the quizzes/tests/final exam. Once found, your quizzes/tests/final exam will receive a **GRADE OF ZERO**. If this happened in a recursive manner, then the instructor would report to the university as an academic dishonesty issue.

Assignments: Homework assignments for this course must be submitted by their due dates, which will be posted on Blackboard and/or announced in class by the instructor. After each section of the textbook is covered, problems will be assigned and posted online on Blackboard under "Assignments," with the due date clearly specified.

Your work should be legible and presented neatly. If your work is unclear or illegible, you will not receive any credit. It is important to write clear, readable solutions, as they will also serve as valuable material for review. You must show both the final answer and the steps leading to it. Simply providing the correct answer will **NOT** earn credit. While you may discuss homework problems with peers, you must write up the solutions independently and fully understand the mathematics and algorithms involved. Please always be mindful of academic integrity.

Late Assignments: Do not wait until the last day to begin your homework. It is important to work on the problems consistently throughout the week. Each assignment is worth 100 points, and late submissions will incur a penalty of 10 points per day. For example, if the assignment is one day late, the maximum possible score will be 90; if it is two days late, the maximum score will be 80, and so on.

Presentations/Debates: You are expected to actively participate in class by presenting and discussing problems that emphasize the most recently covered topics, which will be related to and complement the homework assignments.

<u>Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance:</u> According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance.
