This course introduces economic systems, forms of business ownership, and considerations for running a business. Students will learn various aspects of business, management, and leadership functions, organizational considerations, and decision-making processes. Financial topics are introduced including money and banking and securities markets. The course includes discussions of business challenges in the legal and regulatory environment, business ethics, social responsibility, and international business. Emphasized is the dynamic role of business in everyday life.

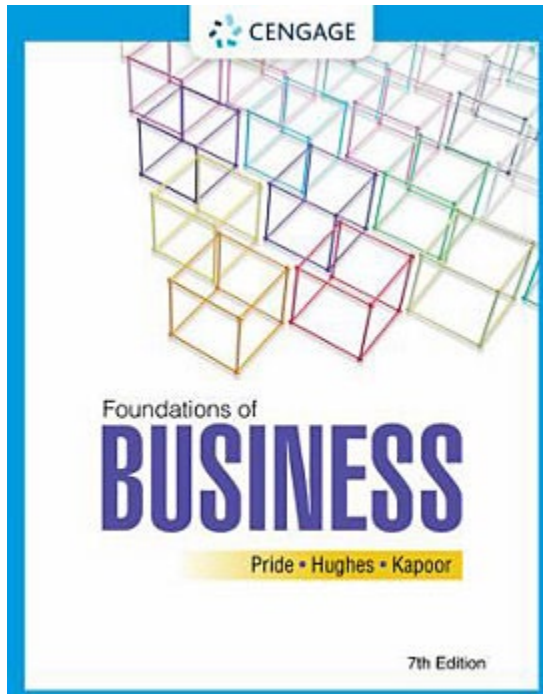

Student Learning Outcomes:

After successful completion of this course, students should be able to:

- Identify the historical basis for and sources of American law, classify the types of law and outline key elements of the U.S. Constitution.
- Outline the structure of federal and state court systems, describe the steps in litigation and explain the main forms of alternate dispute resolution.
- Define and explain the basic elements of a contract, apply them to specific cases and explain contract defenses.
- Determine when a contract is breached and select the appropriate remedy for breach.
- Explain the difference between intentional torts, negligence and strict liability, and the applicable defenses and the remedies available for each.
- Describe the purpose of criminal law, identify the elements of certain specific crimes, choose among available defenses, and apply punishment for criminal violations.
- Explain the difference between real and personal property, describe the means of ownership and outline basic principles of bailment.
- Outline basic agency and employment law principles, explain the role of the independent contractor, and describe basic labor laws.
- Provide the key elements of sole proprietorships, partnerships, and corporations, and explain the advantages and disadvantages of each.
- Classify and explain the types of intellectual property and identify cyber-crime issues.

Exams:

There are 4 objective style exams (multiple choice) available on Blackboard, that will cover the assigned readings. Exams will be due by Sunday at 11:59 PM CST noted on the schedule below. Each exam is multiple choice test, based on the readings. You have 70 minutes to complete the exam. Note that when you log on you cannot leave and re-enter the test. You must complete the test once you begin. You have 50 multiple choice questions to answer in 70 minutes.

Discussion Boards:

There are 11 discussion topics assigned on Blackboard that are available on Monday, midnight through Sunday, end of day (11:59pm). You must submit your main response of 250 words by Wednesday and respond of at least 100 words to one (1) other classmate or professor on two (2) separate days. Your responses must be substantial contributions to the assignment, supported by at least three (3) sources (statutes, cases, articles). Use the university online library system to locate scholarly sources.

Class Attendance:

This course is strictly asynchronous and so attendance is **NOT** required. Students are responsible for the materials covered in class. The course is intensive and challenging, and you are expected to master the materials presented in class. Additionally, adhering to the due dates is important so that you do not become overwhelmed during the term. Students are strongly encouraged to ask questions and participate in class discussions and problem solving.

Extra Credit:

There will be no extra credit.

Make-up and Late Assignments/Discussion Policy:

There will be no make-up exams or discussion boards (DB), and no late exams or discussion boards will be accepted. If you missed the cut-off date for class work as noted above, **make-up** may be accepted/administered only in extraordinary circumstances, such as, an excused official university activity, a severe illness, or a dire emergency. However, you must provide comprehensive documentation either before or within a few days of the missed assignment/discussion posting. Make-up work must be coordinated with the instructor prior to accomplishing it. Any missed class work will not be accepted after the class ends.

Class Conduct and Civility Code:

Everyone in class is expected to follow all rules in the student handbook, as well as common courtesy during classroom lectures and discussions in class and online, including the following:

1. Attendance may be taken at the beginning or the end of the class.
2. It is the students' responsibility to obtain and be able to use the required materials and software for this class.
3. Students must retain copies of all assignments and graded work for verification purposes. Keep copies of all computer files and e-mails.
4. Talking while the instructor is lecturing is extremely disruptive and discourteous to the instructor and other students.
5. Using computers or phones (except for a valid urgent need) during class for a purpose not related to class is disruptive. All cell phones and gadgets should be turned off and headphones removed.
6. For any questions about the discussions and assignments, a student should contact the instructor before the day they are due, so the instructor may have enough time to provide feedback.
7. All communications will be via e-mail communications to the Texas A&M University e-mail account, and students are expected to use their school provided email account. The instructor will reply to student e-mail messages within 24 hours during weekdays (Monday-Friday) and Saturdays until 9:00 p.m.
8. All assignment submissions must be uploaded to Blackboard by the due date.

Academic Dishonesty:

Any assignment found to contain plagiarized material or be the result of any academic dishonesty will receive a grade of zero (0). In addition, two instances of academic dishonesty will result in the grade of F being assigned for the course. In all academic work, the ideas and contributions of others must be appropriately acknowledged and work that is presented as original must be, in fact, original. Using an AI-content generator (such as ChatGPT) to complete coursework without proper attribution or authorization is a form of academic dishonesty. If you are unsure about whether something may be plagiarism or academic dishonesty, please contact your instructor to discuss the issue.

Exams Policy:

You must provide me with prior notice if you miss the final exam in a non-emergency situation. Failure to do this will result in a 20-point reduction in your exam grade. Any makeup exams should be taken within one week of the scheduled exam date.

Definition of a Credit Hour:

A credit hour is an amount of work that reasonably approximates: not less than one hour of classroom or direct faculty instruction and a minimum of two hours out of class student work each week for approximately 15 weeks for one semester, or the equivalent amount of work over a different amount of time; at least an equivalent amount of work as outlined in the item above for other academic activities as established by the institution including laboratory work, internships, practicum, studio work, and other academic work leading to the award of credit hours. (This information is in accord with federal regulations regarding the definition and assignment of credit

hours under section 600.0 and 600.24(f) of the Higher Education Opportunity Act. A credit hour represents a unit of measures of instruction consisting of 60 minutes, of which 50 minutes must be direct instruction over a 15-week period in a semester system. Academic administrative units are responsible for ensuring that credit hours are awarded only for work that meets this requirement. (This is in accord with The Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board definition.) Transfer credits will be evaluated for equivalency to this requirement. Students should expect to invest a minimum of two hours of additional work for each hour of classroom or faculty instruction per week.

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance:

According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. If Title IV funds are disbursed to ineligible students (including students who fail to begin attendance), the institution must return these funds to the U.S. DoE within 30 days of becoming aware that the student will not or has not begun attendance. Use of artificial intelligence (AI) tools, including ChatGPT, is permitted in this course for students who wish to use them. To adhere to our scholarly values, students must cite any AI-generated material that informed their work (this includes in-text citations and/or use of quotations, and in your reference list). Using an AI tool to generate content without proper attribution qualifies as academic dishonesty and violates Texas A&M-San Antonio’s standards of academic integrity.

The Six-Drop Rule:

A non-punitive drop does not affect the student's GPA. However, course drops that exceed the maximum allowed by SB 1231 will be treated as "F" grades and will impact the student's GPA.
