Catalog Course Description: This course builds upon the concepts learned in ACCT 3303 Intermediate Accounting II providing an in-depth understanding of the source and use of authoritative accounting pronouncements. The course provides an exhaustive study of the accounting for liabilities and owners' Equity. Special emphasis is given to the accounting principles for long-term liabilities, stockholders' equity, income taxes, pensions, leases, and statement of cash flows. Students will acquire practice in using the concept of the time value of money to determine the value of leases and long-term liabilities.

Course Objectives: The objective of the course is to provide a basic understanding of financial accounting. Especially, this course focuses on understanding accounting procedures for firms' investing and financing activities.

Prerequisites: Admitted into the College of Business, grade of "C" or better in ACCT 3303.

Student Learning Outcomes:

After successful completion of the course, the student will:

- (a) describe the function and primary focus of financial accounting, explain factors that encourage high-quality financial reporting, and describe the four basic assumptions underlying GAAP;
- (b) demonstrate the way to identify and account for investments classified for reporting purposes as held-to-maturity;
- (c) explain the adjustments made in the equity method when the fair value of the net assets underlying an investment exceeds their book value at acquisition.;
- (d) describe the components of shareholders' equity and explain how they are reported in a statement of shareholders' equity;
- (e) explain the usefulness of the statement of cash flows and prepare a statement of cash flows with the aid of a spreadsheet or T-accounts;
- (f) understand and apply accounting principles and procedures involving hedge accounting;

AACSB Assessment: The College of Business is in the process of applying for AACSB accreditation. As part of that process, students will be assessed on program level outcomes based on course outcomes from various courses. The materials from this course may be used for assessing such program level outcomes, and hence students must follow the necessary rigor to ensure mastery and retention of the above course outcomes.

- **Computer Hardware:** In order to participate in online course materials, you will need a computer with an internet connection. To complete the class work, you will need appropriate software installed on the computer.
- **Time Expectation for coursework:** You are expected to spend 3-6 hours per week for the course. Based on the background, some students may require more time. Time spent may be longer when assignment/exams are due.

Grading Policy: The final course grade will be based on your performance on the quizzes, exams, assignments and attendance using the following weights:

The final letter grades will be assigned as follows: Above 90% → A; 80 – 89.99% → B; 70 – 79.99% → C; 60 – 69.99% → D; Below 60% → F.

If you missed more than one-fourth of the classes, your final grade will be adjusted to one letter lower. **If you missed more than 50% of the classes, your final grade will be F.** This course has a requirement of a grade of C as a minimal grade for satisfactory completion of this course. **The instructor reserves the right to adjust the student's final grade based on the overall performance.**

Examinations: There will be two mandatory mid-term exams and a mandatory final exam (as per university schedule). The exams/quizzes will consist of conceptual multiple-choice questions, and problem-solving questions. The exam/quiz materials will come from lecture notes, the text, and class discussions. Questions will emphasize understanding and applications of concepts and topics covered in class. **Missing an exam will result in a grade of zero for that exam and may result in a fail grade in the course.**

Assignments: Problem solving homework will be assigned for most of the chapters. The purpose of homework is to apply the information learned during class. Each problem-solving homework assignment will be available for two weeks to complete it. Students can refer to the homework schedule to find out exact dates for each assignment.

Make up and Late Assignment/exam/quiz policy: As a general rule, make-ups or late submissions will **NOT** be offered or accepted for any missed assignments/exams/quizzes. Late submissions or make-ups may be accepted/administered only in extraordinary circumstances such as an excused official university activity, a severe illness, or a dire emergency. However, you must provide comprehensive documentation either before or within a few days of the missed assignment/quiz/exam.

Course Requirements every student must fulfill in order to succeed in course:

1. Students should check the Course Calendar, Announcements, and Emails on a regular basis.
2. Students should keep current with all course assignments, quizzes, and examinations.
3. If the course uses remote proctoring for exams, students must schedule their exam early in the semester.
4. Students should ask questions and communicate with the instructor either in class, online, off-line or during office hours.

Course Drop Policy: You may drop the course on or before **April 17, 2026** with an automatic grade of W. If you wish to drop the class after that date, you will receive either a W (if you have satisfactory record so far) or F. The last date to drop a course or withdraw from the University is **May 1, 2026**. If you wish to drop the class, you must submit the necessary paperwork to the proper authority.

Class conduct and civility code: Everyone in class is expected to follow all rules in the student handbook, as well as common courtesy during classroom lectures and discussions online, including the following:

1. It is the students' responsibility to obtain and be able to use the required materials and software for this class.
2. For any questions about the exams and assignments, a student should contact the instructor **before the day they are due**, so the instructor may have enough time to provide feedback.
3. All communications will be via e-mail communications to the Texas A&M University e-mail account, and students are expected to use their school provided email account. It is the responsibility of the student to check their TAMUSA email regularly to receive updates on the logistics of the course. The instructor will reply to a student e-mail messages within 48 hours during weekdays (Monday-Friday).

Class attendance and Participation: A vital part of every student's education is regular attendance of class meetings (for face-to-face/hybrid classes/online synchronous classes) or regular review of class materials posted by the instructor for asynchronous classes. Any absences tend to lower the quality of a student's work, and frequent or persistent absences may result in a failing grade. Students are responsible for the materials covered in class.

The course covers a lot of material, and most students find at least some parts of it difficult. The course is intensive and challenging, and you are expected to master the materials presented in class. The structure of the class makes your individual study and preparation outside of class extremely important. Reading the assigned chapter(s) and having some familiarity with them before class will be very useful for understanding lectures.
