This is the original self-help book written in the 1930s. It has sold millions of copies. One of the precepts we will study in ethics is the importance of Point of View. This is in fact Carnegie's entire thesis.

Every person believes that he or she is the center of the universe and does no wrong. Until one grasps that one is not likely to have much success in influencing people. This will be the most important book you will read in college.

This can be downloaded in a kindle edition from amazon for a mere \$3.20. Please do this and start reading ASAP. Past classes are always amazed at Carnegie's simple revelations.

Other Recommended Reading Material: In a new recommendation, I highly suggest students buy the Gleim EQE Exam Questions Answers. Gleim is in the accounting test prep business. Gleim has thousands of questions across the four CPA exams as well as the Two CMA, CIA, and EA exams. You choose the text you are using and then you can access the questions from the Gleim database for your selected learning objectives. The cost is \$29.95 for each book or discounted at \$150 for audit, financial, tax, law, and managerial. I think this is an excellent review and gets one into the mode of advanced test taking. I will demonstrate in class.

Group Activities

To assure class participation the class will be divided into groups of four. Please feel free to assemble your group of your choosing ASAP. Groups will be assigned specific portions of the text or end of chapter questions to solve. Last semester students used short power points to assist in this effort. This will require the use of your computer, camera, and microphone. Bring your ppt on a usb, do not e mail it to me.

I adopted this strategy when we went on-line. The idea was to avoid your watching my talking head for the entire class via computer which is boring. This involved the entire class and broke the monotony of online by moving from group to group. I also allowed students to work on power point skills and their presentation technique. The result was that my SRI scores improved by a whole half point. Feedback was that the students enjoyed the experience and it made the class seem to go much

faster. And this is not a debit credit class, it is a matter of learning a process and should be a discussion type environment.

Adopt A Company

This is a course about auditing. The purpose of an audit for a public company is the issuance of an audit report, 10K, required by the SEC. Hence it makes sense for all students to have read and understood such a report. Each of you will pick a public company. Then write a summary of the major sections. I will walk you thru a report as a demonstration. Major sections include company profile, management discussion, risks, Notes to statements, financial statements. This is much easier if you state your choice on the discussion board, that way no two do the same company as we can all see the choices. Start writing early this semester on your journal. Make a journal post each week on your company. Bingo in two months the written report is done. Pick a company which interests you, retail, manufacturing tech, whatever. You might pick a company with offices in SA, handy for a future interview!

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance: According to the
