Course Description

Study of criminal behavior and methodology; causation; typologies of criminal acts and offenders; punishment, corrections, and incapacitation; prevention of crime. TSI Restriction(s): Reading, Math, and Writing

Levels: Undergraduate

Student learning Objectives/Outcomes

By the conclusion of the course, students will have the opportunity to understand and critically assess issues related to:

- Explain the major macro- and micro-levels concerns of a criminologist
 - Examine the contributions of theologians, philosophers, and social analysts to the study of crime causation.
 - Identify the major theories of crime and its causes and discuss selected sociological and political theories concerning criminal behavior.
 - Assess the evidence supporting or contradicting extant theory.
 - Apply theoretical constructs and extant research to public policy.

This is a format, punctuation, word usage, citation, and style guide that is invaluable to students in their writing throughout their undergraduate program. Students will also better these mechanics for use in other subject areas as well as better prepare themselves for graduate work.

Course Requirements

Discussion Board Post/Reply: Throughout the course, you are required to post a response to various prompts on the discussion board section of Blackboard. Each prompt/question of the post must be at least 8-10 sentences in length (1-2 paragraphs) and should directly relate weekly material and cite sources accordingly. The post will be assessed on completeness, correctness, and quality of writing.

Further, each week you must respond to at least 1 classmate with substantive contributions, e.g. you must respond with additional information, offer a different perspective regarding the author's (classmate's) position, etc. Simply agreeing or offering congratulatory remarks ("Good post") are not sufficient and unnecessary. Each response must be 4-5 sentences in length (1 short paragraph).

Examinations: There will be three closed-book exams administered throughout the semester (inclusive of the Final Exam). The exams cover the assigned readings, notes, videos and any additional materials presented or provided. Additional information regarding the format, structure, and specific material will be provided in advance.

No student will be permitted to make up a missed exam unless sufficient documentation is provided. This must be discussed with the Professor

Vignette Responses: These short writing assignments require the student to respond to hypothetical examples of criminal behavior. A theory and accompanying prompt will be provided to which the student must respond. Each vignette journal entry must be at least 600 words and will also be graded on the quality of writing. APA citation, where appropriate, is required. The assignment, in sum, will constitute 15% of the overall grade and will be broken into three parts based on various theoretical areas. Specifically: Part I will focus on Rational Choice Theory; Part II will focus on Trait Theory; and Part III will focus on Social Process Theory. More details will be provided on Blackboard.

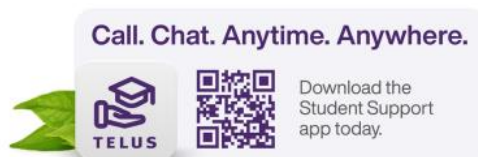

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance: According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. If Title IV funds are disbursed to ineligible students (including students who fail to begin attendance), the institution must return these funds to the U.S. DoE within 30 days of becoming aware that the student will not or has not begun attendance.
