Even before the American Revolution, “America” represented an entirely new vista of possibilities to Europeans, from conquest and profit to rebirth and independence. On the other hand, “America” held many different meanings for Indians, free and enslaved Africans, lower-class white Europeans, and successive waves of immigrants from all over the world. The United States has grown out of these struggles for meaning among social groups, cultural and intellectual traditions, and political movements. In this class, we will explore how the idea of America evolved from Reconstruction to the present. What did it mean to be an American? What did “America” symbolize on the world stage. Because this is a college course, it requires students to sharpen their ability to think about facts and not just memorize them. Students will discuss, interpret, analyze, and write – activities that represent core academic skills needed to succeed in college and the wider professional world.

We will develop these skills in a series of History group activities, during class time and sometimes outside of class. In these activities, students will get the opportunity to do the work that historians do, exploring artifacts, images, film clips, advertisements, and other primary documents to draw some conclusions about not only the ‘what’ but also the ‘how,’ ‘why,’ and the ‘so what’ of history. Keeping up with the reading schedule, completing assignments on time, taking good class notes, and attending class meetings prepared to discuss assigned topics are each CRUCIAL!!!! This course meets the standards for the American History category of courses under the core curriculum.

Learning Outcomes: At the end of this course, the student will be able to:

1. Create an argument through the use of historical evidence.
2. Analyze and interpret primary and secondary sources.
3. Analyze the effects of historical, social, political, economic, cultural, and global forces on United States history prior from 1865 to present

Classroom Policies

Participation/Attendance Policy: You must be present in order to succeed in this course. This means faithful, punctual attendance.

Discussion Board: These will take place online via Blackboard. For each of these posts, you will respond to the question that I pose and then respond to 2 other students to receive full credit.

Reflection Papers: You will write three, 2–3-page reflection papers covering topics that the instructor assigns. Papers will need to be double-spaced and 12-point font. Once the topic and topic question are given, you can utilize the WLDD Center to help you work on flow of paper. Your opinion matters and it is acceptable to use "I" in reflection papers in my class.

Quizzes: You will be completing 4 quizzes online via Blackboard. The quiz will be open for 1 week and is posted in your syllabus. Once you start the quiz on Blackboard, it will be timed, and the clock will begin then.

Civility Code: We will participate in discussions that occasionally touch on controversial issues. Therefore, it is important that we show respect for each other in the tone and content of our comments. You should strive to treat your classmates not only the way you would like to be treated (the Golden Rule), but the way they would like to be treated (the Platinum Rule).

Make-Up Policy: My policy on make-up of work will be fluid due to the circumstances of life. I will work with every student in the class to make this experience positive. Please make sure to communicate with me often so that we can put a solid plan in place if there are unforeseen circumstances.

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance

According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance.
