Recitations: As part of Math1325, students are required to attend a weekly recitation session. In weekly recitation sessions, we will meet and will review the material, provided in-class assignments and/or participation exercises, & answer questions on the material covered in class & homework problems.

NOTE: This class meets 3 times a week—Aside from the 3+ hours that you spend in class each week, you should devote at least another 4 to 6 hours to studying on your own: reading the book & my lecture notes, working out homework assignments & solving extra related problems for practice, etc. You are responsible for any & all materials/topics discussed in this class.

COURSE DESCRIPTION & MATERIALS:

Course Overview: This course is the basic study of limits and continuity, differentiation, optimization and graphing, and integration of elementary functions with emphasis on applications in business, economics, and social sciences etc. This course is not a substitute for MATH 2413, Calculus I. This course meets the standards for the Mathematics category of courses under the core curriculum.

Prerequisite: MATH 1314 College Algebra or MATH 1324 Mathematics for Business and Social Sciences I with a grade 'C' or higher, or equivalent or department approval.

Required eTextbook and Online Homework Platform: Online access code for *Mathematics with Applications In the Management, Natural & Social Sciences*, 13th ed., Lial, Hungerford, Holcomb, 2019, Pearson Addison-Wesley, ISBN- 9780137892198 (E-book included with access code). Optional: Students can purchase a loose-leaf version of text for a low cost if desired (check bookstore).

Calculator Policy: A graphing calculator is required in this course and I will be using the TI-83 (plus) in class. Calculators will not be provided. Many topics will be covered with the aid of the TI-83 (or TI-83 plus) graphing calculator. Other graphing calculators may be used; however, the student is responsible for learning how to operate them. Symbolic calculators such as the TI-89 and TI-92 will not be allowed. Calculators may not be shared. **NOTE:** Laptops, cell phone, & other mobile devices are NOT acceptable calculators.

Student Learning Outcomes: Upon completion of this course, students will:

1. Recognize and apply appropriate differentiation techniques to obtain derivatives of various functions, including logarithmic and exponential functions.
2. Solve and explain application problems involving differentiation and related rates.
3. Solve and interpret optimization problems with emphasis on business and social sciences applications.
4. Determine and apply appropriate integration techniques.
5. Recognize, solve, and explain business, economics, and social sciences applications problems using integration techniques.

MATH 1325 helps students develop Critical Thinking, Communication, and Empirical and Quantitative Skills by focusing on student understanding of basic differential and integral calculus concepts to include recognizing, identifying, solving, analyzing, and explaining application of various mathematical functions in management, economics, and business problems.

1. Limits and the Derivative (Sections 11.1 ~ 11.4)
2. Additional Derivative Topics (Sections 11.5 ~ 11.9)
3. Graphing and Optimization (Sections 12.1 ~ 12.6)
4. Integration (Sections 13.1 ~ 13.4)
5. Additional Integration Topics (Sections 13.5 ~ 13.6)

The instructor reserves the right to modify/update the topics as appropriate.

COURSE WORK & GRADE DISTRIBUTION:

Class Participation: Students are expected to either attend lectures or watch the recordings posted on Blackboard. Be aware of what has been covered in every class and any announcements and course policy changes made in class. Announcements and changes will also be communicated through Blackboard. You are welcome to ask questions during my office hours; however, it is your responsibility to learn the material.

Homework: Homework will be In MylabMath and you have unlimited number of times to complete the assignment until its due date.

Worksheets: Worksheets will be enrichment exercises that are to be done outside of the classroom to help understand the topics covered in class. They will not be accepted late. The worksheet grade will be the sums of the best 10 worksheets to achieve the 100 points.

Quizzes: Quizzes will be done in MylabMath, and you will have 3 attempts per Quiz. Lowest two quizzes during the semester will be dropped. Overall grade on quizzes will be recorded in MylabMath.

Exams: There will be three in-class exams during the semester. The tentative dates are February 11, March 4, and April 8. All exams are closed books and closed notes to be completed on the day assigned. The Exams will be covered in class in case you miss an exam or find out that you will miss an exam, you should contact me either in person or by e-mail, at least one week in advance of the exam for non-emergency cases or within 24-hrs of the scheduled exam date for emergency cases. Any missed exam counts as a 0 unless the student has a valid documented excuse and contacts me as soon as possible after the excuse for missing the test arises.

Final Exam: In order to pass this class, students *must* take a comprehensive final exam scheduled during Finals Week. Finals cannot be rescheduled or missed (for dire & unforeseen medical or family emergencies, students must consult with me). The final exam may be used to replace your lowest regular exam grade. **The final exam must be completed by the announced due date. NO EXCEPTIONS.**

NOTE: There will NOT be an extra credit assignment, please DO NOT ask for it at the end of the semester. Start studying today! You have enough time to get the perfect grade. To be successful in this course, take responsibility for your learning & plan to study at least 2 hours for each class hour. Do not get behind; do not hesitate to ask for help. Make good use of the resources that are available to you, especially your book & your instructor. Save all your graded assignments, exams & quizzes until you receive your final grade.

Course Objectives: That student should perform at a 70% or better average on exams, homework, class participation, worksheets, and quizzes covering the topics listed in the course description and those topics included in the daily schedule.

COURSE REQUIREMENTS & EXPECTATIONS

Class Attendance: Attending class is **mandatory** & attendance will be taken daily. Absences of students are recorded without exception, from the official date of enrollment. Both tardiness and early departure from class may be considered forms of absenteeism. In all cases, students will be held responsible for completion of course requirements covered in their absence. Students are expected to attend class as scheduled and be prepared to participate in discussions, in-class exercises, quizzes, and problem presentation. If you miss class, you are responsible for finding out what you missed on that day. You are welcome to ask questions on the topics that you missed; however, it is your responsibility to learn the material. You are strongly encouraged to attend all classes. In addition, if an unavoidable situation prevents you from being on time or if you must leave early, please minimize class interruption.

Make-up Policy: There are no make-up for daily quizzes or worksheets, rather the lowest of these will be dropped. You are expected to always be present for major exams. Exams must be taken on the date specified. **No make-up exams will be given.** However, the lowest of the three regular exams may be replaced by the final exam score. Extenuating circumstances that may force a student to miss a test should be discussed with the instructor immediately, if possible before the scheduled test date.

Blackboard: Students are responsible for checking Blackboard regularly for announcements, assignments, & other support materials posted there. However, students are also responsible for all announcements & assignments which are given in the classroom. 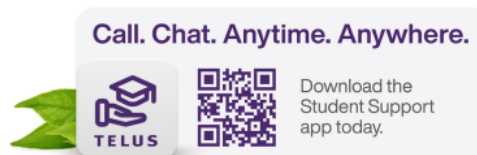
