**Catalog Course Description:** This course integrates training theory and application for the high performing organization. Students examine training systems, strategies and practices critical in driving high performing organizations. The training process is mapped and discussed within the overarching framework of designing and planning training activities to meet organizational needs that are both strategic and tactical.

**Course Objectives:** Improve organizational performance and minimize organizational risk.

1. Plan and conduct training needs analysis.
2. Determine strategies for training solutions.
3. Evaluate training methods for organizational fit.
4. Determine instructional objectives, plan, design, implementation, and evaluation.

**Time Expectations for coursework:** You are expected to spend 4-8 hours per week on the course. Based on the background, some students may require more time. Time spent may be longer when assignment/exams are due.

***Course Requirements every student must fulfill to succeed in course:***

1. Students should check the Course Calendar, Announcements, and Messages (e-mail) systems in Blackboard on a regular basis.
2. Students should keep current on class recordings, if not attending the live class (either in person or online).
3. Students should keep current with all course assignments, quizzes, and examinations.

If a student is unable to attend a session, the instructor will make the recording of the session available for the student to view. All materials will be made available through Blackboard or through online links.

**Grading Policy:** The final course grade will be based on your performance on the quizzes, exams, assignments, and team project using the following weights:

The final letter grades will be assigned as follows: Above 90%  $\Rightarrow$  A; 80 – 89%  $\Rightarrow$  B; 70 – 79%  $\Rightarrow$  C; 60 – 69%  $\Rightarrow$  D; Below 60%  $\Rightarrow$  F.

- **Discussion Questions (DQ):** Students will be assessed through responses to Chapter Discussion Questions. Answers will be scored 100 (thoughtful answer supported by multiple sources of evidence); 80 (thoughtful answer supported by one source of evidence); 70 (thoughtful answer but not supported by evidence). Missed Discussion Questions will be scored a zero. Scores earned for all Chapter Discussion Questions will be averaged and the resulting value will be weighed by 30% and **contribute 30% of the student's final grade (equal to a maximum of 30pts).**
- **Quizzes (QZ):** Students will be assessed through quizzes following selected chapters. Quizzes will be timed and composed of 20 multiple choice questions. Quizzes will be posted under the Course Content Blackboard link. Quiz scores will be averaged over the course of the semester and **contribute 30% of the student's final grade (equal to a maximum of 30 pts).**
- **Team Project:** Students will be assigned into small groups for a semester project in the role of consulting teams. Students will assess the results of a Case Study and respond to the questions asked. Deliverables will a type-written project summary paper using APA format.

Students will select a project leader and assume supporting roles in problem-finding & analysis, research and problem solving, and recommended action plan. The project leader will evaluate member participation; team members will evaluate project leader leadership. Assignment instructions and supporting materials will be posted under the Blackboard Course content link. All work should be submitted through the respective Course content link. The Project will **contribute 40% of the student's final grade (equal to a maximum of 40 pts).** Team project scores will be posted on MyGrades.

**Group Activities:** This class requires students to be active in person (for face-to-face classes or virtual participation for online classes) with the team for a team project. You will be assigned to a team and must work as a team the entire semester.

**Note:** Individual work on this team projects are not accepted. You must work with the team to receive credit on the project. Teams may remove inactive members by notifying the instructor at least four weeks prior to due date.

**Make up and Late Assignment/exam/quiz policy:** As a general rule, make-ups or late submissions will NOT be offered or accepted for any missed assignments/exams/quizzes. Late submissions or make-ups may be accepted/administered only in extra-ordinary circumstances such as an excused official university activity, a severe illness, or a dire emergency. However, you must provide comprehensive documentation either before or within a few days of the missed assignment/quiz/exam.

### **Artificial Intelligence (AI) Policy:**

#### **Broader Use of Generative AI Permitted Within Guidelines**

Use of artificial intelligence (AI) tools, including ChatGPT, is permitted in this course for students who wish to use them. To adhere to our scholarly values, students must cite any AI-generated material that informed their work (this includes in-text citations and/or use of quotations, and in your reference list). Using an AI tool to generate content without proper attribution qualifies as academic dishonesty and violates Texas A&M-San Antonio's standards of academic integrity.

**Class conduct and civility code:** Everyone in class is expected to follow all rules in the student handbook, as well as common courtesy during classroom lectures and discussions in class and online, including the following:

1. Attendance may be taken by an appropriate method by the instructor.
2. It is the students' responsibility to obtain and be able to use the required materials and software for this class.
3. Students must retain copies of all assignments and graded work for verification purposes and provide it to the instructor, if necessary. Keep your own copies of all computer files and emails till final grade is received.
4. Talking while the instructor is lecturing is extremely disruptive and discourteous to the instructor and other students.

instructor will reply to student e-mail messages and voice messages within 2 business days (Monday-Friday).

8. All assignment submissions must be uploaded as instructed by the due date and time. The submission window may close or be marked late, even if late by one second.

Anyone violating these policies may be subject to disciplinary actions.

**Class attendance and Participation:** A vital part of every student's education is regular attendance of class meetings (for face-to-face/hybrid classes/online synchronous classes) or regular review of class materials posted by the instructor for asynchronous classes. Any absences tend to lower the quality of a student's work, and frequent or persistent absences may result in a failing grade. Students are responsible for the materials covered in class.

The course covers a lot of material, and most students find at least some parts of it difficult. Class participation is highly encouraged as it makes the class more interesting and enhances the learning experience. Students are strongly encouraged to ask questions, participate in class discussions and problem solving, and visit/contact the instructor during office hours in case of questions or concerns. Good attendance and participation will be rewarded when final grades are assigned.

The course is intensive and challenging, and you are expected to master the materials presented in class. The structure of the class makes your individual study and preparation outside of class extremely important and may vary considerably based on student background. However, a **minimum** of two hours of work outside the class is expected for every one-hour of class period per week. Reading the assigned chapter(s) and having some familiarity with them before class will be very useful for understanding lectures.

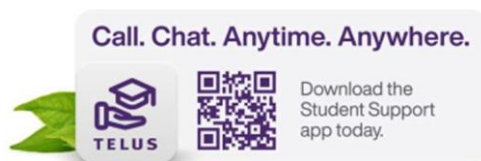

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance: According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance.
