### Virtual Office Hours

### Preferred Communication

As the instructor for this course, my preferred method of communication is through Blackboard email. I answer emails during the working hours of (9am – 5pm) Monday – Friday. Allow me 48 hours (2 business days) to respond to your email. If I don't respond by then, please send a follow up email. ### Dual Credit

## **Catalog Description**

A general survey of music literature designed for the non-music major. Representative composers and their works are studied through recordings, lectures, reports, and live performances. The course focuses on the appreciation and analysis of musical compositions and performances, synthesis and interpretation of artistic expression and critical, creative and innovative communication about works of art. This course meets the standards for the Creative Arts category of courses under the core curriculum.

## **Student Learning Outcomes**

The goals of this course are as follows:

- Identify and discuss the complexities of music from various cultures and eras of time.
- List and define the elements of music (Ex: pitch, rhythm, dynamics, tempo, etc.)
- Develop aural skills in recognizing composers and their nationalities, genres, historical periods and dates, & definitive features of selected musical examples.
- Develop writing, research, creativity, and communication skills that can be useful in other coursework.

## **Grading Descriptions**

### **Connect Reading Assignments:**

Students have access to all three textbooks as e-books through the Connect platform. Reading assignments (which can also be heard in audiobook form) will be given each week for students to complete on their own time for each week. Reading assignments will be accompanied by comprehension questions which will be factored into the reading assignment grade.

### **Video Lectures & Online Music Activities Listening Journals:**

Each week, the instructor will cover a new music topic and have students complete various tasks such as briefly summarizing information, answering specific questions asked in the lecture or provided media, and completing a listening journal related to the content for that week.

Responses should be within (2-3) paragraphs in length and answer all prompted questions. DO NOT upload photos of handwritten assignments. Is it recommended to use Microsoft Word, or other similar writing apps to complete these assignments.

**Mid-Term:** Although there is no exam administered for the mid-term, the mid-term grade is a snapshot of the student's current grade average at the 8-week mark during the semester. The mid-

term grade is NOT an official posted grade on your transcript; it is there to let students and admin know current standings mid-way through the semester.

### **FINAL EXAM INSTRUCTIONS**

For the MUSI 1306: Music Appreciation FINAL EXAM, students will create a research presentation video focusing on only one of the following topic selections.

1. A formal composer.
  - Ex: *Stephen Schwartz and the Music from Wicked*
2. A world music artist or group.
  - Ex: *Fela Kuti and his Impact on African Music*
3. A featured world instrument.
  - Ex: *Caribbean Steel Pan: The Music of Trinidad and Tobago*

These are just examples of presentation topics that have been done in the past. Do not be limited to these examples.

For the presentation video, students should use tools such as PowerPoint, Canva, Spotify, YouTube, etc. Then utilizing screen share apps such as Apple screen share, Zoom, Loom, etc. to record the presentation. Allow yourself plenty of time to complete this and edit as necessary. Students are encouraged to use the computers located in the library on campus, if needed.

RUBRIC: Students will be graded on the following criteria:	Points
1. Proper selection of topic (composer, performer(s), or instrument). This means having the topic approved by the instructor prior to submission.	10 points
2. During the presentation, a discussion of at least (3) musical selections following the assigned prompt instructions. This includes allowing the audience to listen to excerpts of mentioned selections.	30 points
3. Successful display of Core 50 objectives: critical thinking skills, communication skills, social responsibility, and teamwork.	30 points
4. Approx.10-15 minutes of presenting. Aim for 10 slides (approx.). Attire: dress appropriately, no workout clothes, PJs, etc.	10 points

5. Use of at least (3) academic sources that are correctly cited (APA, MLA, or Chicago). Consult the TAMUSA Citation Style Guide for tips on citing/formatting. Link is included on Blackboard. Include proper citations on last slide.	10 points
6. Reply with comments/questions on at least (3) other presentations.	10 points

### **Academic Sources**

On campus, the university library is the best place to start looking for sources for any academic subject. Academic sources are scholarly books, articles, and research papers that are typically peer-reviewed, credible and authoritative. Peer-reviewed sources are written by an expert in the field and have passed review by other experts who judged the source for quality and accuracy. If a source is peer-reviewed, there's a really good chance it's a good choice for high-quality, accurate information. **For these assignments, please avoid using websites like Britannica, Wikipedia, IMDb, etc.**

Below I will list Zoom screen share instructions for those unfamiliar. Your TAMUSA credentials should allow you to access Zoom for screen share recording. The screen share recording of your presentation can be through any app, it doesn't have to be through Zoom. Keep in mind where you are saving your finished meeting video on your computer before starting to record.

1. Open Zoom App.
2. Start new meeting.
3. Select "Share" icon at bottom of screen (In Green).
4. **Then click the small box for "Share Sound".**
5. Then click "Share" (in Blue).
6. Click the "More" Icon (...)
7. Select "Record" It's recommended to "Record to this computer".
8. When finished recording, END meeting.
9. Locate Zoom. mp4 video file.
10. Upload video file to YouTube as unlisted (recommended).
11. When you are ready to submit on Blackboard, go to the Final Exam discussion board and click "post a response to the discussion". In the upper toolbar, click the (+) (add content) tab on the upper right corner, then click embed media. You then should copy/paste the URL for your unlisted video, and it should appear for us to see.

Doing this will allow others to conveniently view your video from Blackboard without having to be sent to YouTube. Other screen share alternatives include apple screen recording tools, QuickTime, Loom, etc. It is recommended to test that your audio sharing works before recording your full presentation.

## **Late Work**

- \* Each week's assignments will be open every Monday @ 12:00am and close Sunday @ 11:59pm which gives students a full 7 days to complete each week's assignments.
- \* Late work will be accepted for a max grade of 70%.
- \* The last day to submit assignments will be posted at the end of the course calendar. Submissions of any kind after this date/time will **not** be accepted. Students that have proper documentation through the university may request extensions.

Use of artificial intelligence (AI) tools, including ChatGPT is permitted in this course for students who wish to use them on the ground of initial research. Students should not use AI tools to complete listening journals or Connect reading assignments. To adhere to our scholarly values, students may however, cite AI generated material that informed their Final Exam presentation research work. This includes intake, citations, and or use of quotations and in your reference list. Using an AI to generate content without proper attribution qualifies as academic dishonesty and violates Texas A&M, San Antonio standard of academic integrity.

## Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance

Texas A&M-San Antonio does not require a pregnant or parenting student, solely because of that status or issues related to that status, to (1) take a leave of absence or withdraw from their degree or certificate program; (2) limit the student's studies; (3) participate in an alternative program; (4) change the student's major, degree, or certificate program; or (5) refrain from joining or cease participating in any course, activity, or program at the University. The university will provide reasonable accommodation for pregnant students as it would be provided to a student with a temporary medical condition that is related to the health and safety of the student and the student's unborn child. These could include maintaining a safe distance from substances, areas, and activities known to be hazardous to pregnant individuals and their unborn child; excused absences because of illness or medical appointments; modified due dates for assignments; rescheduled tests/exams; taking a leave of absence; and being provided access to instructional materials and video recordings of lectures for excused absences, if these would be provided to any other student with an excused absence. Texas A&M-San Antonio has also designated the Title IX Coordinator as the liaison officer for current or incoming students who are the parent or guardian of a child younger than 18 years of age. The Title IX Coordinator can provide students with information regarding support services and other resources. Young Jaguars can support parenting students with daycare if students meet this criteria: (1) must be enrolled in classes at Texas A&M-San Antonio in the current semester, (2) must be Pell eligible or a single parent, (3) child(ren) must be aged 3 to 12-years-old, and (4) child(ren) must be enrolled in Pre-K-3 through 6th grade. ## Students' Rights and Responsibilities

The following statement of students' rights and responsibilities is intended to reflect the philosophical base upon which University Student Rules are built. This philosophy acknowledges the existence of both rights and responsibilities, which is inherent to an individual not only as a student at Texas A&M University-San Antonio but also as a citizen of this country.

## Students' Rights

1. A student shall have the right to participate in a free exchange of ideas, and there shall be no University rule or administrative rule that in any way abridges the rights of freedom of speech, expression, petition and peaceful assembly as set forth in the U.S. Constitution.
2. Each student shall have the right to participate in all areas and activities of the University, free from any form of discrimination, including harassment, on the basis of race, color, national or ethnic origin, religion, sex, disability, age, and pregnancy/parenting or veteran status in accordance with applicable federal and state laws.
3. A student has the right to personal privacy except as otherwise provided by law, and this will be observed by students and University authorities alike.
4. Each student subject to disciplinary action arising from violations of university students' rules shall be assured a fundamentally fair process.

## Students' Responsibilities

1. A student has the responsibility to respect the rights and property of others, including other students, the faculty, and administration.
2. A student has the responsibility to be fully acquainted with the published University Student Rules found in the Student Handbook, Student Code of Conduct, on our website, and University Catalog, and to comply with them, as well as with federal, state, and local laws.
3. A student has the responsibility to recognize that student actions reflect upon the individuals involved and upon the entire University community.
4. A student has the responsibility to recognize the University's obligation to provide a safe environment for learning.
5. A student has the responsibility to check their university email for any updates or official university notifications.

Students are expected to exhibit a high level of honesty and integrity in their pursuit of higher education. Students engaging in an act that violates the standards of academic integrity will find themselves facing academic and/or disciplinary sanctions. Academic misconduct is any act, or attempt, which gives an unfair advantage to the student. Additionally, any behavior specifically prohibited by a faculty member in the course syllabus or class discussion may be considered as academic misconduct.
