## Course Description:

*Course Catalogue:* Theory and phenomena of social psychology. Includes the nature of social variables and the methods used to study them, and covers topics such as the self, conformity, persuasion, prejudice, relationships, altruism, attitudes, attribution, conflict, and peacemaking. Prerequisites: PSYC 2301.

## Course Layout & Assignments:

### ❖ Lectures

- Lecture will take place in person during the designated period. Students are expected to regularly attend lecture. Any lecture content covered is subject to be quiz/exam material. Therefore, students are expected to know this information.
- **PowerPoint Slides:** These printable slides will have basic headers, but you may need to fill in the gaps with details provided during lecture.
- **Textbook Chapter:** There will be several assigned chapters from the textbook that you are expected to read in order to complete the review quizzes, critical thinking reflection papers, and receive additional information regarding content covered in lecture.
  - **Word to the wise: Students should plan on having and reading the textbook for this course.** There is a lot of material that will be covered, and additional examples and explanations provided in the book will help students better understand content.

### ❖ Syllabus Quiz: A **10 point syllabus quiz** will be posted in Blackboard and **must be completed by the end of the day on January 26th**. STUDENTS MAY TAKE THE SYLLABUS QUIZ MULTIPLE TIMES TO EARN FULL CREDIT!

### ❖ Review Quizzes: At the end of each unit, there will be a review quiz comprised of 8-10 questions. Questions may be formatted at multiple-choice, true/false statements, and/or short answers. Students will have 20 minutes to complete these quizzes. They may be posted on Blackboard or administered in class. In the event that a quiz will occur during class time, you instructor will announce it in the previous class period.

### ❖ Exams: There will be **three 100-point exams** this semester (see calendar). Each exam will cover between approximately 4 chapters of material and will be comprised of a random combination of multiple-choice, true/false statements, and short-answer questions related to content discussed in the textbook, lectures, other YouTube videos, research articles, etc.

- Exams will be administered in person. Students are expected to arrive promptly to class
  - Students will be given 75 minutes to complete each exam. If you arrive late, you will have the time remaining during the assigned exam period.
- Students will not be able to use their notes and textbook while taking the exam.
  - This means you will be expected to know the material from memory without any external forms of assistance
- A study guide will be provided prior to each exam to help students better prepare.

### ❖ Other Assignments

- **Think About It (Write Ups):** On several occasions, you will be asked to write responses to a prompt/topic that will require you to apply what you have learned in class and integrate relevant content from the textbook. Each response must be at least 1 full page in length Word document and be uploaded as an attachment under the Assignment link in Blackboard.

- **Other Activities:** Many of the other activities will include tasks like completing questionnaires, exercises, and other tasks that are designed to highlight and showcase an aspect of social psychology relevant to the Unit these tasks are assigned in.
- ❖ **Attendance & Participation – 30 points total**
  - This class is in-person, so students need to plan to attend in-person (i.e., there will not be any online attendance options). **To ensure compliance, attendance will be taken daily via a combination of roll-call and/or in class activities / non-grade pop quizzes** students will submit as evidence of attendance.
  - Attendance and participation expectations include:
    - a) being on time / staying for the duration of class unless given permission otherwise
    - b) refraining from excessive use of cell phones during lecture time for non-class related reasons
    - c) being engaged during class discussions, activities, and answering questions when called upon (sleeping during class does not constitute “being in attendance”)
  - **Students are permitted to miss up to two classes without penalty. Beginning on the 3<sup>rd</sup> absence, students will receive a 3-point penalty for each subsequent absence.** Excuse absences will not count against these totals, but students will need to provide documentation and/or receive instructor approval. Your instructor reserves the right to decide whether something qualifies as an excused absence. If students are unsure of whether something qualifies as an excused absence, they should communicate in a timely manner with their instructor.
  - In the event of an unexpected, but extended absence, students will need to communicate with their instructors to determine the appropriate course of action. Your instructor will do their best to work with students to establish appropriate accommodation in such instances.

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### Missed Exam and Late Homework Policy

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- ❖ **Make Up Policy:** When written documentation of an excused absence is provided ([review absence notification link here](#)) or students have received permission directly from their instructor, then a make-up for a missed exam/quiz/assignment can be completed within 3 days of the absence. 
