Course Description:

An introduction to the methods and analysis of data from psychological studies. Fundamental concepts and techniques of both descriptive and inferential statistics and their application to psychological research. Prerequisites: PSY 2301 (Introduction to Psychology) and MATH 1314 / MATH 1242 with minimal grades of C or higher; Co-requisites PSYC 2188.

Contact Guidelines

Email: Email will be the most effective way for us to communicate outside of lecture. Students are expected to check their email **daily**, and they are expected **1) to only use their official university e-mail through Blackboard and 2) to include course and section (e.g., PSYC 2388) and your full name when sending emails to your professor.**

I will check his email regularly on Monday – Friday from 9 to 5. During this timeframe, I will generally respond within 24 hours. If you do not hear back from me, email again in the event your message went to my Junk email box, or follow up with me during lecture/office hours.

On weekends, I am generally unavailable by email, but will reply on the subsequent Tuesday based on the order in which the emails were received.

Office: During the designated office hour times (see above), I will be in my office for students who wish to discuss aspects relating to coursework, grades, etc. Virtual meetings are potentially possible pending an advance request and confirmation from me. If you are not available during that time, request an alternative appointment time may be made, but such requests are subject to my availability.

Blackboard: Blackboard will serve as the location for pertinent materials for our course (i.e., lecture slides, assignment details, handouts, etc.). If you need a course document (syllabus copy, schedule, homework assignment), you will find it there. I will upload materials and links on Blackboard.

Course Structure & Grades:

Attendance & Participation – 25 points total

- This class is in-person, so students need to plan to attend in-person (i.e., there will not be any online attendance options). **To ensure compliance, attendance will be taken daily via a combination of rollcall and/or in-class activities / non-graded pop quizzes, and** students will submit as evidence of attendance.
- Attendance and participation expectations include:
 - being on time / staying for the duration of class unless given permission otherwise
 - refraining from excessive use of cell phones for non-class related reasons
 - being engaged during class discussions, activities, and answering questions when called upon (sleeping during class does not constitute “being in attendance”)
 - repeated tardiness can be considered an absence!
- **Students are permitted to miss up to two classes without penalty. Beginning on the 3rd absence, students will receive a 3-point penalty for each subsequent absence.** Excuse absences will not count against these totals, but students will need to provide documentation and/or receive instructor approval.
- Your instructor reserves the right to decide whether something qualifies as an excused absence. If students are unsure of whether something qualifies as an excused absence, they should communicate in a timely manner with their instructor.
- In the event of an unexpected, but extended absence, students will need to communicate with their instructors to determine the appropriate course of action. Your instructor will do their best to work with students to establish appropriate accommodation in such instances

Class Project Days – ATTENDANCE IS MANDATORY!!!

- The class project is designed to integrate your knowledge of the research process, newly learned statistical analyses, and your writing skills.
- The class project days will be essential to collecting data, reviewing APA formatting guidelines, and discussing important aspects related to the various writing drafts and the Final Term Paper.

Writing Drafts – 20 points each; Three different drafts

- Over the course of the semester, students will produce several written drafts for a quantitative APA-style paper. Each draft will have a specific set of instructions and a grading rubric that students will be expected to follow. The assignments and their rubrics will be discussed during the lecture.
- Students will be provided feedback on each writing assignment, which will then need to be implemented when students produce their final term paper (see Final Term Paper below). Students should ask questions if they are unclear about their feedback and what revisions they should make.

Final Term Paper – 80 points

- At the conclusion of the semester, students will submit their final term paper based on the class research project that includes revised versions of each writing draft and complies with APA formatting standards for a quantitative paper (a rubric will be provided). These revised drafts will be organized into a singular document that includes each of the following elements: 1) a title page, 2) a method, 3) results, 4) discussion, 5) references, and 6) a figure (graph).

Exams – Four total exams each worth 100 points; the lowest exam grade is dropped.

- Exams will consist of a mixture of multiple-choice and written problems. Multiple choice questions typically focus on your understanding of ideas or your ability to complete small tasks. Written problems will have you demonstrate your ability to carry out statistical procedures.
- All tests will be of a similar format and cover the most recent chapters in class; however, many of these concepts build upon one another, so students should review previous material.
- The final exam will focus primarily on the last portion of material presented in the course, but will also be cumulative to assess the knowledge you have gained throughout the semester.
- Exams will be completed during in-person class sessions, and students will have the whole period to complete them without the assistance of lecture notes, books, or classmates!
- **Students will not be allowed to retake any exam they have previously taken.**

Homework

- Homework assignments will be posted and submitted through Blackboard by the due date indicated on the syllabus. These assignments are designed to improve students' ability to calculate, explain, and apply their knowledge of material covered in class.
- Questions with more components will be worth more points. Points earned for each question will depend on the accuracy and completeness of your answer.

Collaborative Institutional Training Initiative (CITI Training)

- As part of their ethics training chapter, students will be expected to complete CITI training (it's free) using the [research library guide](#). This guide provides instructions on how to register for a free account. Students will need to complete the Social & Behavioral Research (Basic Course) and then upload a copy of their completion certificate to a link in Blackboard.
- It is worth noting that students who may anticipate attending graduate school or are interested in volunteering as a research assistant or pursuing directed research at TAMUSA, this training would be something you would have to complete as part of your training, so you would have a bit of a head start!

Grades will be posted on Blackboard, where students can access them. Missed Exam and Late Homework Policy

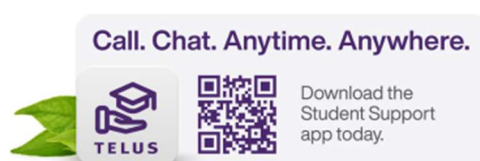
