Catalog Course Description

The objective of this course is to understand the modern tools and methods used in economic decision-making. The course is designed for students with limited or no background in economics. The focus of the course is on the study of supply and demand, price theory, competition, market structure, market failure, and the role of government in addressing economic issues. This course satisfies the social behavioral sciences requirement under the core curriculum.

Course Objectives

The objective of this course is to familiarize students with fundamental economic concepts, such as opportunity cost, demand/supply, and elasticity. Additionally, the course will introduce the economic way of thinking, which includes simplifying assumptions and modeling techniques. Through this course, students will gain the analytical tools necessary to understand how both individuals and firms make decisions and how various factors influence these decisions.

Prerequisites

ENGL 1301, ENGL 1302, MATH 1314 or MATH 1324. TSI Restriction(s): Reading, Math, and Writing. Students who do not meet the pre-requisites must contact their advisor.

Student Learning Outcomes

After successfully completing the course, students should be able to:

1. Explain the thought processes of economists;
2. Understand demand and supply, describe how markets achieve equilibrium, and identify factors influencing this equilibrium;
3. Define elasticity and demonstrate how to calculate it;
4. Define and calculate both consumer and producer surplus;
5. Identify externalities, public goods, and common resources, and discuss appropriate market optimization policies when these factors are present;
6. Analyze the impacts of price controls and taxes on market dynamics.

Required Materials

- **Textbook:** *Greg Mankiw, Principles of Microeconomics. Any edition. Cengage Learning. Custom e-book.* The e-book and included material are available to purchase at the university's book store.

Examinations and Quizzes

Each quiz will be accessible online for a duration of 6 days, allowing you the flexibility to take it at a time and location that suits you. Both the midterm and the final, however, will be conducted in class. If you have a legitimate reason preventing you from attending an exam in person, it's imperative that you notify the instructor at least one week in advance. With the instructor's approval, you may then opt to take the exam at the University Testing Center or through an online proctoring service.

AI Assignments

Each week before class, identify one concept from the previous lecture that you found difficult or confusing. Use an AI chatbot (e.g., ChatGPT, Gemini, Grok, or Claude) to explain the concept briefly at three levels:

- Explain X to me as if I were 5 years old, in one paragraph
- Explain X to me as if I were a high school student, in one paragraph
- Explain X to me as if I were an established professional in Economics or Finance, in one paragraph (use appropriate jargon that makes me sound intelligent and well-read in the subject)

Then, after reading the three explanations, write 2–3 sentences explaining which level helped you the most and why.

Each week, four students will be selected at random to share their responses in class.

Make up and Late Assignment/exam/quiz policy

Late submissions and make-up exams are not allowed unless the student provides verifiable evidence of an emergency situation.

Class conduct and civility code

Everyone in class is expected to follow all rules in the student handbook, as well as common courtesies during classroom lectures and discussions in class and online, including the following:

1. Attendance may be taken at the beginning or the end of the class.
2. It is the students' responsibility to obtain and be able to use the required materials and software for this class.

Class attendance and Participation

A vital part of every student's education is regular attendance of class meetings. Any absences tend to lower the quality of a student's work, and frequent or persistent absences may result in a failing grade. Students are responsible for the materials covered in class. The course covers a lot of material and most students find at least some parts of it difficult. Class participation is highly encouraged as it makes the class more interesting and enhances the learning experience. Students are strongly encouraged to ask questions, participate in class discussions and problem solving, and visit/contact the instructor during office hours in case of questions or concerns. Good attendance and participation will be rewarded when final grades are assigned.

The course is intensive and challenging and you are expected to master the materials presented in class. The structure of the class makes your individual study and preparation outside of class extremely important, and may vary considerably based on student background. However, a **minimum** of two hours of work outside the class is expected for every one hour of class period per week. Reading the assigned chapter(s) and having some familiarity with them before class will be very useful for understanding lectures.

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance

According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include

class attendance. If Title IV funds are disbursed to ineligible students (including students who fail to begin attendance), the institution must return these funds to the U.S. DoE within 30 days of becoming aware that the student will not or has not begun attendance. Faculty will provide the Office of Financial Aid with an electronic notification if a student has not attended the first week of class. Any student receiving federal financial aid who does not attend the first week of class will have their aid terminated and returned to the DoE. Please note that any student who stops attending at any time during the semester may also need to return a portion of their federal aid.

The Six-Drop Rule

Students are subject to the requirements of Senate Bill (SB) 1231 passed by the Texas Legislature in 2007. SB 1231 limits students to a maximum of six (6) non-punitive course drops (i.e., courses a student chooses to drop) during their undergraduate careers. A non-punitive drop does not affect the student's GPA. However, course drops that exceed the maximum allowed by SB 1231 will be treated as "F" grades and will impact the student's GPA.

Drop Policy

You may drop the course with an automatic grade of W on or before the date listed in the academic calendar at www.tamusa.edu. The last date to drop a course, or withdraw from the University is also indicated in the academic calendar on the university website (www.tamusa.edu). If you wish to drop the class, you must submit the necessary paperwork to the proper authority. Students dropping a course are subject to all conditions listed in the university catalog.
