**Course Description**

ENGL 1302 builds on the reading and writing skills developed in ENGL 1301 and invites students to enter academic discourse through research wherein they will be asked to synthesize and respond to a variety of perspectives on a topic of their choosing. Students will also read and compose a variety of texts oral, written, and visual.

**Course Outcomes**

All First-Year Composition (FYC) courses are part of the Texas Core Curriculum. They are specifically designated as “Core 10” courses, which focus on communication. According to the Texas Higher Education Coordinating Board, “Core 10” courses “involve the command of oral, aural, written, and visual literacy skills that enable people to exchange messages appropriate to the subject, occasion, and audience.” These courses are expected to achieve the following Core Curriculum outcomes:

<b>Skills</b>	<b>Description</b>
Communication	The effective development, interpretation, and expression of ideas through written, oral, and visual communication
Critical Thinking	Creative thinking, innovation, inquiry, and analysis, evaluation and synthesis of information
Personal Responsibility	The ability to connect choices, actions, and consequences to ethical decision-making
Teamwork	The ability to consider different points of view and to work effectively with others to support a shared purpose or goal

Here are some of the ways your FYC course might help you to achieve these outcomes:

- **Communication** – Your instructor will likely teach you “rhetorical agency,” which is the ability to make intentional choices when composing texts for different audiences and contexts
- **Critical Thinking** – Your instructor will likely ask you to analyze a variety of texts, with particular attention both to the choices the authors/artists made and to the way language functions in society. This is called Critical Language Awareness
- **Personal Responsibility** – You’ll fulfill this outcome mostly through reflection on your writing practices and processes. This could take the form of “labor logs” and “labor journals.”
- **Teamwork** – You’ll do a lot of group-based work this semester. This could look like the formation of “Writing Communities,” but it could also look like small-group discussions and collaborative activities.

Not all FYC courses will help you to achieve the Core Curriculum outcomes the same way, but they are all designed to help you achieve the outcomes.

All materials needed for this course are available through Open Education Resources and links will be provided on blackboard. I encourage you to look through these resources because there might be topics you are interested in learning about that we do not cover in class. Reading assignments will also be made available as pdf copies on blackboard before the assigned dates.

## Blackboard

This course uses Blackboard extensively; most writings will be submitted as attachments on Learn, as will much of the homework. While some instruction will be provided, it is the student's personal responsibility to learn how to attach files and submit work on Blackboard. There may occasionally be problems submitting work. In that case, try again. Try with a different browser. Contact the help desk. When all else fails, contact me via email and attach your assignment.

## Grading Overview/Labor Based Assessment

In this class I utilize labor-based assessment which assesses you on the quality of your labor rather than the quality of your finished product. This means that you will be assessed on the work that you complete. There will be a special emphasis on your ability to meet deadlines and meet or exceed assignment expectations. Quality and attention to detail will ensure that your level of writing will improve and that you will grow as a scholar. In short, the more you work, the better your grade—and the better you'll position yourself to learn and grow. You can check your total grade at any time in Blackboard. Your assignments are incomplete if you submit them on time, but fail to meet expectations. Your assignments are late if you submit them after the deadline, and missing if not submitted. Please email me or visit my office to request an extension (in advance) or a revision on a previously submitted assignment.

## Course Assignments

This course is reading and writing-intensive, and will also include a lot of online discussion. Throughout the semester, you will publish major assignments to your Writer's Portfolio. Major assignments include an Annotated Bibliography, Synthesis Research Paper, an Abstract, a Final Presentation Brochure, and a Final Presentation. Formative weekly assignments include Online Discussion Boards, Reading Notes, Labor Logs, and Labor Journals.

## Generative AI

The FYC program expects you to generate your own content this semester. Relying on generative AI to write content for you prevents you from growing as a university-level writer and critical thinker. However, there are situations and contexts within our courses where you may use generative artificial intelligence (GAI) tools to support your work as a writer. For example, GAI technologies such as ChatGPT can work well as a starting point for written assignments, assisting you with brainstorming, outlining, generating ideas, and collecting basic information about a topic/idea. Note that the emphasis here is on "support." GAI programs have been shown to provide biased or incorrect information, and to generate writing that lacks human imagination. For these reasons, the FYC program discourages you from using GAI technology to generate content **for you**. If you have reason to use GAI to generate content **with you**, consult with your professor before doing so. If your professor approves your use, you should acknowledge the GAI program

you have used and identify which portions of the text you submitted were produced by GAI. Using GAI content without your professor's permission and/or without proper attribution qualifies as plagiarism.

### *Plagiarism*

We recognize that what constitutes plagiarism depends upon context. As such, we work with you to learn how different genres, professions, and academic disciplines define plagiarism. In the context of your FYC classes, plagiarism is defined as the intentional use of another's "language, ideas, or original (not common-knowledge) material" without acknowledgement (["Defining and Avoiding Plagiarism"](#)). If you are found to have committed plagiarism as defined here, your instructor may report you for academic dishonesty, and you may be subject to failing the assignment or even failing the class.

### *Online Classroom Environment*

I am committed to fostering welcoming classroom environments where all students are not only respected and understood but are also recognized as powerful resources for building communities of writers both in the classroom and across campus. While working with classmates and instructors, I ask that you:

- respectfully share your unique experiences and perspectives
- demonstrate respect for and openness to the perspectives and experiences of others
- value the opportunity to learn from difference

Demonstrating respect for those different from you not only prepares you for success in the classroom, but it also prepares you for success as citizens and professionals in a global community.

Because I value the respectful expression and exchange of ideas, students who use violent, harassing, and/or discriminatory language will be reported to the university and may be subject to Student Code of Conduct policies.

## **Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance**

According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. If Title IV funds are disbursed to ineligible students (including students who fail to begin attendance), the institution must return these funds to the U.S. DoE within 30 days of becoming aware that the student will not or has not begun attendance. Faculty will provide the Office of Financial Aid with an electronic notification if a student has not attended by the published Census Date (the first week of class). Any student receiving federal financial aid who does not attend prior to the published Census Date (the first week of class) will have their aid terminated and returned to the DoE. Please note that any

student who stops attending at any time during the semester may also need to return a portion of their federal aid.

### **Jaguar Writing, Language, and Digital Composing Center (WLDCC)**

The Jaguar Writing Center provides writing support to graduate and undergraduate students in all three colleges as well as faculty and staff. Writing tutors work with students to develop reading skills, prepare oral presentations, plan, draft, and revise their written assignments. A non-punitive drop does not affect the student's GPA. However, course drops that exceed the maximum allowed by SB 1231 will be treated as "F" grades and will impact the student's GPA.

## **Students' Rights and Responsibilities**

### **Students' Rights**

2. - Writing Assignment: Tell me what your annotation strategy is.
- Digication: upload your annotated article and the information about how you annotate to your digication page.

#### Week 5 (2/16-2/20): Style Matters, MLA and APA

- Assignment: choose 3 quotes from one of your sources and then write a paragraph using the quote as a citation. Cite the correct citation style for your discipline. Labor Log and Reading Notes due.

Week 6 (2/23-2/27): Keeping an Annotated Bibliography (the backbone of research)

- Writing Assignment pick one source from your annotated bib. Write a summary of the article, paraphrase the main argument, list 3 quotes you think are important and what they mean to you. Labor Log and Reading Notes due.
