Catalog Course Description

Microeconomic theory applied to managerial decision-making.

Course Objectives

The objective of this course is to strengthen students' comprehension of fundamental economic concepts, including demand, supply, production, and costs. Additionally, it introduces advanced tools like game theory. Students will learn to distinguish various market structures and utilize the associated concepts and tools to make optimal managerial decisions.

Prerequisites

None.

Student Learning Outcomes

After successfully completing this course, students will be able to:

1. Explain how a specific economic event can impact the demand, supply, and market equilibrium of a good.
2. Utilize regression analysis in Excel to estimate a product's demand function.
3. Recognize different types of market structures and determine the profit-maximizing price and quantity for a firm within each context.
4. Employ game theory to anticipate the outcomes of interactions between firms.
5. Identify practices that contravene US antitrust laws.

Time Expectation for coursework

You are expected to dedicate 2-4 hours per week (in addition to watching the lectures) for this course. Depending on individual backgrounds, some students may need more time. Expect to spend additional hours during exam periods.

Course Requirements to succeed in course

Examinations and Quizzes

Each quiz will be accessible online for a duration of 6 days, allowing you the flexibility to take it at a time and location that suits you. Both the midterm and the final, however, will have limited time. If you have a legitimate reason preventing you from taking the exams at the determined date, it's imperative that you notify the instructor at least one week in advance. With the instructor's approval, you may then opt to take the exam on another date.

AI Assignments

Each week before class, identify one concept from the previous lecture that you found difficult or confusing. Use an AI chatbot (e.g., ChatGPT, Gemini, Grok, or Claude) to explain the concept briefly at three levels:

- Explain X to me as if I were 5 years old, in one paragraph
- Explain X to me as if I were a high school student, in one paragraph
- Explain X to me as if I were an established professional in Economics or Finance, in one paragraph (use appropriate jargon that makes me sound intelligent and well-read in the subject)

Then, after reading the three explanations, write 2–3 sentences explaining which level helped you the most and why.

Each week, four students will be selected at random to share their responses in class.

Make up and Late Assignment/exam/quiz policy

Late submissions and make-up exams are not allowed unless the student provides verifiable evidence of an emergency situation.

Financial Aid and Verification of Attendance

According to the following federal regulation, 34 CFR 668.21: U.S. Department of Education (DoE) Title IV regulation, a student can only receive Title IV funds based on Title IV eligibility criteria which include class attendance. The Six-Drop Rule

Students are subject to the requirements of Senate Bill (SB) 1231 passed by the Texas Legislature in 2007. SB 1231 limits students to a maximum of six (6) non-punitive course drops (i.e., courses a student chooses to drop) during their undergraduate careers. A non-punitive drop does not affect the student’s GPA. However, course drops that exceed the maximum allowed by SB 1231 will be treated as “F” grades and will impact the student’s GPA.
